

### ANNUAL REPORT ON TIMBER PATROL OF WEST LANE ISSUED

Reports for the past year on the work of the Lane County Forest Fire Patrol association were announced today by Earl G. Muir, president. The association during the season provided protection for 505,427 acres of which 90,776 were lands of members. 214,904 acres protected under contract with the state, 180,100 acres of revested O. and C. grant lands protected under contract with the federal government, and 10,547 acres protected for the Douglas County Fire Patrol association, the report shows.

Reports of the wardens show that 85 fires occurred which burned through 2903 acres of merchantable timber, 7400 acres of old burn and cut-over land and killed 23,905,000 feet of timber.

Lookout stations are maintained by the association at Prairie mountain and Roman Nose. One head warden, eight patrolmen and one dispatcher were employed on the fire protection work during the regular season. Three new trails were constructed during the season and 95 miles of telephone line and 76 miles of trail were inspected and repairs made where necessary, the annual report states.

The association purchased a portable fire fighting pump with 1000 feet of hose for use last year. A hydro-thermograph for registering the relative humidity was also added to the equipment of the association, the report shows.

Nine-five owners of timber lands in the western Lane district are members of the association. Officers of the association are: Earl G. Muir, president; J. L. Ward, vice-president; C. C. Scott, secretary and treasurer.
