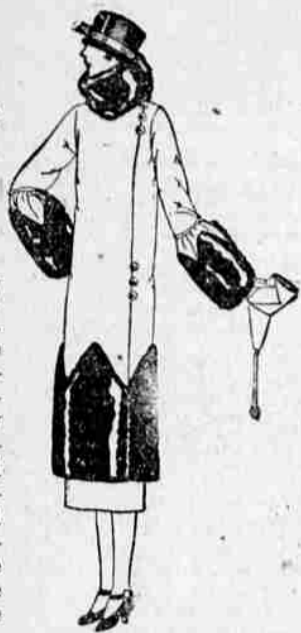

New Cable in Service—The new Western Union high speed cable which is under construction between New York and Italy is now in

service between New York and Spain, and the construction is under way between Spain and Italy, according to word received by J. A. McKevitt, local Western Union manager. This cable is of special construction and so made that it will carry 1500 letters per minute, or equal to radio. The cable is laid via The Azores and will greatly facilitate the handling of traffic between the United States and the above-named countries.

Jail Population Drops—Only 34 prisoners were confined today at the Lane county jail which is a rather low figure considering that as high as 50 have been there at several times during the past few months. "It's getting very lonesome around the hotel with only 34 of the boys here," is the lament of H. L. Lee, county jailer. The jail constructed for 12 prisoners a number of years ago will be abandoned and a new building erected if plans backed by several local civic clubs are carried through.
