

TILT DEVELOPS IN HOUSE WHEN TWO BILLS ARE READ

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 26.—A sharp tilt developed in the house this morning when house bills 72 and 73, introduced by Bushlight, Multnomah, came up for final reading. The two bills would affect the plumbing laws of the state, the first repealing a number of existing sections and the second providing for new plumbing codes.

A council of Jackson county declared that the law would "send about 10,000 more inspectors running around the state."

Representative Fitzmaurice of Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler, opposed the measure, holding that it would prohibit unlicensed persons from doing simple plumbing jobs. The two measures were referred to the revision on laws committee.

Three Bills Retired

Three bills pertaining to game matters were referred to the game committee. One would prohibit beaver killing and hunting throughout the state.

The house adopted senate joint resolution number 6 memorializing congress to appropriate funds to build a veterans' hospital at Portland on grounds which the board of regents of the University of Oregon medical school has offered to donate. The memorial points out that the lease on the Hahnemann hospital, number 77, at Portland, expires December 4, 1925.

House Bill 85, the Mills convention plan, was referred to the judiciary committee on motion of Representative Hammond, Clackamas county, who pointed out that a page of the bill had been omitted in printing.

Many Bills Passed

A number of bills were passed by the house during the morning session. They include house bill 16 providing for a change in the time of court session in the second judicial district; house bill 33 making a slight amendment to the law pertaining to the sale by a county official and acquired through tax delinquency; house bill 57 which would compel publication by municipal corporations of a statement on bonded indebtedness, outstanding warrants, and other debts in connection with notices of tax levy meetings; house bill 61, providing that the Salem justice of peace shall be placed on a flat salary of \$2400 a year instead of continuing on the fee basis, that \$100 a month be provided for clerk hire and \$50 for rent; house bill 71, giving the board of control wider scope in administering the J. T. Apperson college students' aid fund; house bill 77, permitting the interstate bridge commissioners to invest surplus funds in bonds; house bill 80, placing the compulsory school age limit at 16 instead of 15.

Eleven new bills were introduced.

SUPERVISORS TO DISCUSS FORESTS

Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest, and Ralph S. Shelley, supervisor of the Siuslaw forest, went to Portland yesterday to attend the meeting of 22 supervisors of forests in Oregon and Washington at the district office. The session will last four days.

Will C. Barnes of Washington, D. C., assistant forester in charge of grazing, who is an author and writer of note, will be one of the principal speakers. C. H. Fry, district forester of Alaska, with headquarters at Juneau, is to attend the meeting, and district foresters from California and Montana are also expected.

Fire prevention will be one of the chief subjects of discussion, and Mr. Macduff will tell of experiences in fire prevention and fire fighting on the Cascade crest this year. Both the local supervisors are to take an active part in the round-table discussions scheduled.

Three Arrested on Canned Heat Jags

"Reprimanding a man who gets drunk on canned heat is not a very successful method of punishing the crime," said Judge George A. Gilmore, city police magistrate this morning, after he had interviewed three men arrested for such an offense. "But what are you to do with such delinquents? It would tickle them to death to be kept in jail, while we pay out the taxpayers' good money to feed them. The best thing we can do is to levy a \$25 fine, and give them 30 minutes to get out of town."

The three prisoners sentenced this morning by Judge Gilmore were James O'Neil, Arthur Murphy and Robert Perkins. The first two men were accused of begging. One carried a bottle of denatured alcohol.

CORONER'S JURY HAS HARD TIME IN HERRIN CASE

HERRIN, Ill., Jan. 26.—(AP)—Faced with many conflicting theories as to the exact manner in which S. Glenn Young, former Williamson county dry raider, his companions, Edward Forbes and Homer Warner, and Deputy Sheriff Ora Thomas, anti-Klan leader, were killed in Saturday night's shooting, the coroner's jury would be unable to arrive at any definite explanation of the affair when it meets tomorrow.

Mrs. Young, wife of the slain liquor raider, asserted that witnesses would be at the inquest to verify an account that her husband had been lured into a trap and shot from behind.

Klansmen Keep Vigil

The body of the slain Young today lay at the First Baptist church, a red cross near the foot of the coffin and Klansmen keeping vigil. The purple robe of the reputed Klansman had been replaced by street clothes.

The bodies of Young's two henchmen and that of Deputy Sheriff Thomas, Young's avowed enemy, were in their homes. A joint funeral was probable.

According to one version, the fight followed a shot fired from the vicinity of a hotel Saturday night. As the report sounded, Young and several others rushed to investigate.

Four Are Killed

In a cigar store they met Thomas and when the smoke cleared, Young, shot through the heart, and two of his followers were dead, while Thomas lay on the floor dying. He died in an hospital soon after, attendants saying death resulted from a wound in his head.

At least four men were known to have been present at the shooting, but their names remained unrevealed. An hour or two later the news reached Governor Small. He immediately communicated with Adjutant General Carlos Black, who dispatched Major R. W. Davis in charge of forty militiamen to Herrin from Carbondale, a few miles away. The dawn of a new day found everything quiet with only battered window panes and bullet-scarred walls as a public testimonial of the night's conflict.

State's Attorney Arlie Bonwell, on his arrival yesterday, gave no intimation of the course the state would pursue.

2067 PUPILS NOT ABSENT NOR LATE

Pupils numbering 2067 were neither absent nor tardy in the Eugene schools during the month of January, according to the report filed with the county school superintendent by Joseph T. Glenn, city superintendent of schools.

The report shows that a total of 3437 pupils were enrolled in local schools, during the entire school year. The present total enrollment is 3005. Of this number, 2379 are enrolled in the first eight grades of school.

Last Farm Census Returns Expected

Two more federal farm census enumerators of Lane have completed their work and now only three are in the field and these are expected to make final returns within the next few days, according to a report today of Ralph P. Laird, director.

Enumerators finishing today are Kenneth Neilson, Crow stage route, and Fred C. Fuhrer, Cottage Grove. Rufus A. Gilmore of Josephine county also reported his district complete today. The census is required to be completed the latter part of the week.

The report calls for information concerning the drivers in the accident, license numbers, location and full details. The state law relating to making reports of traffic accidents will be enforced strictly, it is stated.

COLORADO HONORS LANE COUNTY HENS

Lane county poultry although far from home are still able to bring down prizes, according to word received by Ben F. Keeney and O. L. Turner, who had displays at the National Western Poultry show which has just closed at Denver, Colo.

Mr. Keeney won second and fourth prizes for barred Plymouth Rock exhibition birds and Mr. Turner was awarded third and fifth prizes for an exhibition cockerel and a dark pullet. Mr. Keeney today sent a display of barred Plymouth rocks to Tampa, Florida, for exhibition at the National Barred Plymouth show.

This display of Lane fowl at a Florida show is considered something of a record in the way of distance for the sending of display poultry.

Consolidation of Schools is Asked

Petitions for the consolidation of school districts 188 and 191 have been asked for by residents of that district and the petitions have been forwarded by E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools. The districts are south and east of Cushman.

The petitions after being signed will be returned to the school office here and the question will probably come before the next meeting of the boundary board, the superintendent states.

COMMISSIONER IN OREGON IS ASKED

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Jan. 26.—House bill 138 introduced this morning by German, Multnomah county, at the request of the license committee of the Portland realty board, would provide for a real estate commissioner in Oregon with a salary of \$3000 a year.

Persons who have made it a practice to slash along streams of the state and let the high water dispose of their trees and brush would be punished by a fine of from \$50 to \$500 or by jail imprisonment from one to six months, under house bill 139 introduced by Reynolds, Marion county. Burning or removing of timber and brush would be necessary before high water seasons.

Sum of \$7500 for the investigation of poultry diseases prevalent in the state would be provided in house bill 140 introduced today by Shrock, Clackamas county. The work would be done in connection with the Oregon Agricultural College's experiment station.

Shrock also introduced house bill 141 providing for an appropriation of \$10,000 to finance "the Oregon hen laying contest." The contest would be conducted under the direction of the Oregon Agricultural college.

The basket limit of steel head salmon in Tillamook county streams where commercial fishing is prohibited would be set at five fish a week under house bill 142, under a bill introduced by Winslow.

The killing of Chinese pheasants in Tillamook county would be prohibited under house bill 143, also introduced by Winslow.

The attorney general of the state would be empowered to name a district attorney of one county to act for another under certain circumstances, in accordance with a bill to be introduced by Representative Peirce, Coos and Curry counties.
