

# ASTORIA MAN TO SPEAK IN EUGENE

Laughlin of Astoria, manager of the Lower Columbia Dairy association will speak on the subject of cream grading at the annual meeting of stockholders of the Eugene Farmers' creamery at the chamber of commerce February 25, it is announced today. Mr. Laughlin will tell of the actual results his organization has accomplished and what it has meant in dollars and cents to them on the price of their butter.

The local creamery is at the present time trying to work out plans whereby all cream will be purchased according to quality, with results that will be satisfactory to all the dairymen, and Mr. Laughlin's talk is expected to be interesting as well as instructive.

At the meeting five directors will be elected to serve for the ensuing year, the annual report will be submitted to the shareholders, and other business transacted. The present officers of the creamery are Frank Needham, president; H. L. Plank, vice-president; Thomas I. Ohlsen, secretary; Hans M. Peterson, and George Platt, directors; C. D. Rorer, treasurer; and M. M. Boney, manager.

# MAYOR IS ELECTED IN PORTLAND MEET

Mayor E. B. Parks of Eugene was elected second vice-president of the newly organized "League of Oregon Cities" at the meeting which closed Saturday at Portland. Twenty-five municipalities of the state are represented in the new organization headed by A. L. Harbort, commissioner of public works of Portland. Mayor J. B. Giesey of Salem is first vice-president.

"Home rule" protection for cities against encroachments of the state legislature is one of the major objectives of the league, according to Mayor Parks. A constitutional amendment was urged to guarantee the rights of the cities of the state to retain full control of their own affairs against any state interference.

The league provides that the mayor and four other persons may be named as representatives but that each city will have but one vote.

Each city under 2500 population shall pay into the league treasury \$10 a year, cities from 2500 to 50,000 shall pay \$25 a year and cities from 50,000 to 100,000 and over shall pay \$50 a year.
