WARNINGS ON BOOK PURCHASE SET OUT

Warnings have been sent to all school superintendents of the state by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, relative to the purchase of textbooks by teachers on the subscription plan through traveling agents.

"Most of these books are not standard or recognized by the state school officials and for that reason their purchase by inexperienced teachers is discouraged," is the statement of E. J. Moore, county superintendent of Lane. Two agents were here recently and requested recommendation of the superintendent on books they were selling. This was declined by Mr. Moore on the ground that the books were not necessary as a part of the textbook requirements.

The following is the letter of the state superintendent: "My attention has just been called to the activities of book agents in several districts of Oregon who are offering their wares to school boards and teachers," said the superintendent. "Many of these books are of little value, but are purchased by school board members who are anxious to do everything possible to aid in the way of library books."

"Many teachers who will not purchase one of these books on the reading circle list each year, will obligate themselves for some subscription books on school methods that have little value, or, at least, are not considered the best obtainable by those who are capable of judging. "I am asking that you do whatever you can to protect school boards and teachers in your county and vicinity by sounding through your teachers' meetings a warning against being duped by the purchase of an inferior article at an excessive price."

LOCAL MEN RECEIVE PAVING CONTRACTS

Although Portland contractors submitted paving bids that were lower than those of local men, the city council voted to "trade at home" yesterday evening at a special meeting, and let five of the contracts to Stien Brothers, and one to Guy Lyle.

The council favored the local men over Portland dealers because they are citizens and taxpayers of Eugene, because they will use all local labor, and because all money spent by the city for this paving will stay in Eugene, said Mayor E. B. Parks.

The paving jobs for which contracts were given are: Columbia street from Franklin to Fairmount boulevard, to Stien Brothers, for \$41,231.30; Charnelton street, Thirteenth to Eleventh avenue, and Thirteenth avenue, Charnelton to Lincoln street, to Stien Brothers, for \$10,008.

Thirteenth avenue, Willamette to Charnelton street, to Stien Brothers, for \$23,831.80; Eighteenth avenue, University to Agate street, to Stien Brothers, for \$42,460.

Seventeenth avenue, Willamette to Jefferson street, to Stien Brothers, for \$21,759.80. Nineteenth avenue, Willamette to Lamson street, to Guy Lyle, for \$11,745.80.

All bids for the paving of Third avenue, from Monroe street to Blair boulevard, were rejected on the recommendation of the street committee. The council will readvertise, asking for bids for an asphalt top. Low bid for this project was submitted by the Oregon Contract company, \$12,140.80.
