ATHLETICS APPEAR AS STRENGTHENED FOR 1925 SEASON

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 28.—(AP)—Comme Mack's Athletics, the mystery team of 1924, are looked upon as the most strengthened rival of the Washington Senators and New York Yankees in the quest for the 1925 American league.

The sensation of the league early in 1925, only to flop back at mid-season, the Athletics played better ball after July 4, last season, in games won, than any other team in the league.

Comme Mack has few predictions to make. He is standing pat on the team that finished the 1924 campaign in such excellent style, but is hopeful that added strength to his battery departments will pull his club up in the race.

Robert (Lefty) Groves, southpaw, acquired from Baltimore for a reputed \$100,000 is the mainspring of Mack's hopes.

For the rest of his mound staff, Mack has six veterans headed by Eddie Roush, famed knuckle ball ace. The others are Bryan Harris and Sam Gray, right handers, and Meeker, Baumgartner and Heimach, southpaws. The new pitching material besides Groves includes Art Stokes, a young right-hander from Des Moines, Iowa, of the Western league.

Behind the bat the Athletics will have the veteran Cy Perkins with two promising newcomers in Jimmy Fox of Easton, Md., and Gordon S. Cochran, Boston university product, who was obtained from the Portland, Ore., club of the Pacific coast league in a deal involving about \$50,000.

The infield will start with Joe Hauser, home run cleaver, at first; Max Bishop at second, Clark Galloway at short, and Jimmy Dykes at third base. The only change of a shift is that Dykes may replace Bishop at second base, with Sammy Hale at the hot corner.

The regular outfield is expected to consist of Al Simmons in center, Bing Miller in left and Bill Lamer in right, pound division.

Robert Jones and Don Cartwright are after the 175 pound laurels. Harry Levitt is the outstanding candidate among the 155 pounders, James Johnson, Ole Peterson and Harvey Woods will represent the school in the 145 pound division.

Perry Davis, who recently won a decision over Emmett Mack of Multnomah club, Sylvester Wingard and Walt Whitcomb are the best bets at 135 pounds, Ford and Chester Sumpston will wrestle in the 125 pound division.

Wells, 175 pounds, a 1924 letterman, will not be able to participate this year because of illness. There are many good wrestlers out but some of them are ineligible as they have not been in school a year.

Thirty-Five Tournaments Planned for Eugene Golf Enthusiasts This Season

Members of the Eugene Country club will participate in approximately 35 golf tournaments during the spring and summer months, according to George McGill, chairman of the club tournament and handicap committee.

Practically every major city in western Oregon will furnish opposition for the Eugene golfers.

Although final arrangements have not been completed, it is expected that within 30 days the tournament program will be fully outlined and a printed schedule giving all dates and particulars will be in each member's hands, Mr. McGill said.

The team tournaments will be spread over the entire season, and the club tournaments will be scheduled between them, thus giving a well balanced program. Every effort is being made to provide club tournaments that will be of interest to all members.

Play Seven Cities. Following are the cities which may be expected to place teams in the field against the Eugene golfers: Corvallis, Salem, Albany, Medford, Roseburg, Marshfield and Portland. It is planned to meet several of the clubs in the Rose City.

The Inter-City tournament, a triangular affair between Eugene, Albany and Corvallis will be held for the first time this year. Eugene and Albany have each chalked up two wins to their credit, and a third victory for either club will mean permanent possession of the cup. Each team makes the rounds of the other clubs, an aggregate total of points the winner.

A trip through the southern part of the state is also planned for the club team. At this time the Medford and Roseburg clubs would be played, and if arrangements can be concluded the team will journey on to Coos bay and tangle with the Marshfield Pirates.

With 12 clubs now operating in Portland it is expected that several live matches can be arranged with clubs in that city.

Tacoma Tourney Interests. The Pacific Northwest Golf association tournament to be held at the Tacoma Golf and Country club on the week of June 22 to 27 will give an opportunity for several Eugene golfers to show their wares. Todd Gardner, Eugene Country club professional, has expressed his intention of entering the open event, and the club will probably send several to compete for the amateur cup.

The first of the club tournaments will be held early in March when a "New and Old Members" tournament will be staged. The matches will be played as fore-somes with a new and old member paired as partners. The purpose of the meet will be to get the new and old members acquainted.

BASEBALL

Questions. 1.—What happens when a team takes more than the two minutes allotted after requesting a "time out"?

2.—Can a player who is much taller than his opponent catch the ball when it is put in play at center or elsewhere?

3.—Is it illegal for a team to retain possession of the ball by passing it from one to the other without making any attempt to score?

Answers. 1.—A time out shall be charged against a team for each two minute period or fraction thereof. 2.—It is illegal to catch the ball when it is put into play at center or elsewhere. It must first be tapped. It can be caught by a player immediately after being tapped. 3.—Such passing is perfectly legal. The opposition always has the opportunity of intercepting any of the passes.
