

SARCOPHAGUS FOR WOODROW WILSON IS SET IN PLACE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—The work of setting in place the sarcophagus erected for Woodrow Wilson in the Bethlehem chapel of the Washington cathedral was brought to completion today.

Recessed in the south wall of the chapel in a space eight feet wide and 18 feet high, the sarcophagus responds under massive arches, with a leaden glass interior window forming the background. A grill, canopy and flags complete the arrangements.

The sarcophagus itself of a warm cream color limestone with almost a golden gleam, bears a single decoration—the Crusader's cross. In front of the cross is inscribed "Woodrow Wilson" and the date of his birth and death—1856 and 1914.

The grill, immediately in front of the sarcophagus and covering the recess to a height of seven feet, seven inches above the floor, is artistically wrought in iron after the manner of the ancient craftsmen, the upright bars ending in crosses.

Just below the cresting of the delicately carved oak canopy, directly over the sarcophagus are the words "I am the Resurrection and the Life, saith the Lord."

The three flags surmounting the canopy and lending color to the whole effect are all historic, two of them being the "president's flag," presented by the government to each president, and representing Mr. Wilson's two inaugurations. The third is the American flag which was carried by the nation's troops when they marched through London—the first American flag ever saluted by an English king on English soil.

TIMOTHY SMIDDY TO RETAIN POST

DUBLIN, Jan. 29.—(AP)—There is no question of recalling Professor Timothy A. Smiddy, Irish Free State minister plenipotentiary from his post at Washington. It was stated in governmental circles here today.

The Free State government has not been informed of the circumstances under which his acceptance of an invitation to be guest of honor at a banquet of the George Washington Sulgrave Institution in New York was withdrawn, and it is awaiting a detailed statement from Minister Smiddy, which is expected in the next mail.

Whatever judgment, the government may form of his action, when fully advised as to the circumstances, it has no intention, it is declared, of changing representation at Washington which is regarded as one of the highest to Ireland.

A London dispatch Wednesday night quoted the Westminster Gazette as saying it understood that the recall of Professor Smiddy was probable in consequence of the Sulgrave banquet incident. In this event, it added, it was doubtful whether the Free State would appoint a successor, at least for the present.

Pat McArthur Will Filed; Estate Said To be About \$64,000

DALLAS, Ore., Jan. 29.—The will of the late C. N. (Pat) McArthur, former representative in congress from Oregon, was filed today with county clerk Hugh G. Black. The estate is estimated under it at \$64,000 with real property in Polk county listed at \$35,000 and personal property in Polk and Multnomah counties listed at \$29,000.

Mrs. Lucille S. McArthur, his widow, is the chief beneficiary. She was allotted \$150 a month as living expenses during the time the estate was being settled, \$1,000 in cash, all household goods and furniture, and the balance of the estate after other beneficiaries and debts had been cared for. The will was executed November 28, 1922. Lewis A. McArthur, a brother, was willed \$1,000 and the collection of postage stamps belonging to Mr. McArthur. His mother, Harriet, was given \$2,000 and O. B. Stauff of Rickreall, \$5,000. His two secretaries, Lillian M. Curry of Washington, D. C., and Lillian M. McCoy of Portland each received \$500.

Gasoline Power Declared Wasted

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—An average of 30 per cent of the available power of gasoline as a motor fuel is being wasted by its discharge in the engine exhaust in the form of combustible gases, the bureau of mines has determined by a series of tests.

"The average carburetor," the report said, "was found to be adjusted too far on the rich side, or, in other words, an insufficient amount of air was admitted with the gasoline, for good economy and proper combustion."

Vada Watson Carries Bag Of Kansas Wheat

KANSAS BOAST IS GIVEN WITH WHEAT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—A blue-eyed miss from Kansas, who raises chickens and cooks for harvest hands, claimed a part of the Washington stage for herself today, while congressmen, cabinet officers and the president paused to do her honor.

She was Vada Watson, 19, daughter of a farmer living near Turon, but her arrival and round of activities during the day attracted as much attention as many a foreign envoy. She was an envoy herself for that matter, because as the "Kansas wheat girl," she carried to President Coolidge a bag of wheat and the message that "Kansas grows the best wheat in the world."

Miss Watson had her visit to Washington timed to coincide with celebration of Kansas day, the anniversary of the admission of Kansas to the union. Incidentally, her visit coincided with the mounting of wheat to a new high price record for the period since the war.

Miss Watson's first engagement was her reception at the White House by President Coolidge to deliver to the president the bag of wheat—some of the wheat harvested by the late President Harding near Hutchinson, Kansas, on his final western trip. Then she was received by Mrs. Coolidge.

The president in accepting the wheat observed that "Kansas not only grows the best wheat in the world, but apparently the best looking girls."
