

MONTANA QUINTET LOSES TO OREGON BY 33-29 SCORE

In spite of its make-shift lineup, Oregon outplayed Montana at the armory last night, and won its first conference basketball game, 33 to 24. The game was so rough that 21 persons were called, with Montana the worst offender, making 13 fouls. The Grizzlies made several spectacular baskets from mid-floor, but were woefully weak in shooting when under the basket.

Oregon played minus the services of Howard Hobson, star forward, who is in the hospital, suffering from a recent vaccination. Coach Reinhart started Gunther in Hobson's place, and then made two other substitutions to improve the teamwork. While Hobson's substitutes played well on the floor, they did not shine in contact with the basket.

Westergren was the outstanding star for Oregon. He seemed to be in every corner of the floor at the same time and caused the visitors no end of worry.

Sweet was taken out of the second period because of four personal fouls. At that time Oregon led, 21 to 16. Montana came within one point of tying the score. Here Oregon called and put the game on ice when Okerberg dropped a basket and converted two fouls, and Stoddard converted for two more field goals.

Okerberg led Oregon in scoring. He shot four baskets and converted six free throws. Ilman and G. Dahlberg were high-point men for Montana.

Oregon will play Washington tomorrow night at the armory, starting at 7:30 o'clock. Should Washington win the Aggie tonight, the game between Oregon and Washington is for the Northwest and Pacific coast conferences. Last night's lineup:

FOOTBALL HUSKIES REPORT TO COACH

Candidates for the 1925 football team of the University of Oregon held their first turnout yesterday afternoon in the Commerce building. Seventy-five athletes reported to Richard Shore Smith, new coach, who succeeds Joe Maddock, resigned.

Every letterman of the 1924 team except Reed, ex-captain, who has graduated, was on hand, as well as practically the whole last year's second team and nearly two dozen players from the freshman squad.

As many players are suffering from the after effects of the smallpox vaccination, Coach Smith has decided to wait until February 9, before he will issue first call for practice on Hayward field.

Until Bart Spellman, line coach, makes his appearance, Smith will concentrate on the centers and punters. He was of the opinion that the center is the most important position on the team and for that reason will spend no little time in getting a speedy pivot man.

The ends and backfield men will also be called soon. Although the new mentor does not plan on having much scrimmage practice, he wants to work out his offensive plays before fall practice opens.

CLEVELAND TO BE CONTENDER DURING YEAR, SAY HEADS

CLEVELAND, Jan. 30. — Confidence that the Cleveland Indians will be a first division contender in the American league race this season is expressed by President E. S. Barnard and Manager Tris Speaker.

"Our team has a lot of possibilities," they agreed. "Due to injuries last season, our club finished sixth, lower than its playing strength justified."

With few exceptions none of his men had his job clinched for 1925. Spiker said, Charley Jamieson, outfielder, Sewell, shortstop, and Glenn Wyatt, catcher, are the outstanding exceptions, he said.

Speaker hopes to get a winning combination out of 34 players who will report at the spring training camp. This list includes 14 pitchers, eight infielders, and nine outfielders.

Finding last year's experiment of sending all his battersmen to Hot Springs for preliminary workouts unsatisfactory, only Pitchers George Uble, Sherry Smith, Jim Edwards, Joe Shante and Ben Kerr, and Catcher Alie Walters will be sent to the Arkansas resort.

Uble, although only 26, is the veteran of the staff, having been with the team since he graduated from the Cleveland sand lots six years ago, but the real veteran is Sherry Smith, former Brooklyn southpaw.

The catching staff will be the same as last year with Glenn Wyatt, a heavy hitter, doing the bulk of receiving, aided by Luke Sewall and Walters. Two men, George Burns and Bob Knox will try out for first base. The second basemen, Chick Fewster and Stephenson and Joe Kinkman will try out.

Joe Sewell, at shortstop and Walker Lutze at third base, look like fixtures.

Outfielders ordered to report are last year's regulars, Jamieson, Sumas and McNulty, with Spiker and four recruits available.

Willamette Loses To Washington by Score of 41 to 18

SALEM, Ore., 30.—The University of Washington basketball team defeated Willamette university here last night on the Willamette floor 41 to 18. The Huskies played the Bearcats off their feet in the first half but piled up only 10 points to Willamette's 15 in the second half.

Hesketh, Washington forward, was high point man of the game with a total of 11 points to his credit, five field goals and one converted foul. The score at the end of the half was 31 to 3 and the Bearcats never came within 20 points of Washington during the second half.
