## Colonial Ball to be Function of the Coming Week

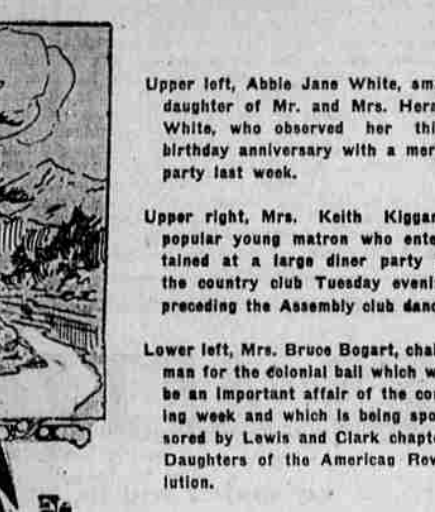
