

# OREGON TO DEVOTE ATTENTION TO BIG CONTEST SATURDAY

The Webfooters, not discouraged by their loss to Washington at basketball Saturday at the armory, 29-10, will put in a strenuous week of practice in preparation for the Saturday game against the Oregon Aggies at Corvallis. Realizing that their only chance for a championship is to set the Aggies back, the players have assigned Coach Reinhart to work faithfully all week.

In spite of their defeat by Washington, the Oregon boys outplayed the visitors, but inability to connect with the basket caused their downfall. They also had many opportunities to chalk up points from fouls, but fared badly in that department.

In a game, however, should have its full strength against the Aggies. # CARDINALS LITTLE STRONGER THAN IN PAST YEAR'S PLAY

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 2.—(AP)—With no outstanding trades made by Manager Branch Rickey to strengthen the hurling staff, the St. Louis Cardinals appear to be little stronger for this year's National League drive than in 1924, when they finished sixth.

The hitting of the team last season was good and the fielding fair. The pitching generally was considered the weak link. Although several new hurling prospects are to receive try-outs, besides such Duster Mails, veteran southpaw, has been obtained from Oakland, the outlook as a whole is uncertain in this respect.

Of the veteran twirling talent, Dickerson and Sothern pitched fairly good ball last season. Others who will be back are Haines, Sherdel, Stuart and Dyer.

Mike Gonzales, the Cuban, is expected to do the bulk of the catching this year. Others are Niebergall and Clemens, with the team last season. Three others, from the minors, will be given tryouts.

The team's main strength lies in the infield, with Bottomly at first, Hornsby at second and Cooney at shortstop considered as fixtures. Hornsby batted .423 last season, the highest mark in modern big league history.

Third base is an open question with Freigau, Lester Bell and Toporcer, as leading candidates.

Another problem for Rickey to solve is the outfield. The Cards have enough outfielders for two or three teams. Blades, Douthit, Hafey, Holm, Muller, Myers, Shimmers and Jack Smith comprise the candidates.

Smith is considered the pick of the lot and almost certain to start in right with Blades in left. Center field is uncertain, especially since Rickey may use Holm behind the bat.

The Cardinals will train at Stockton, Cal., where they will gather on or about February 22. A schedule of 27 exhibition games has been arranged on the Pacific coast.
