SALEM, Ore., Feb. 2.—That either Robert B. Kuykendall or George Neuner will be appointed United States attorney for Oregon, is the latest indication contained in information received here from Washington.

These two are the leading candidates for the office and State Senator Rittner has received a telegram from Senator Stanfield saying that one of the two probably will be appointed. A few days ago, when it appeared that a deadlock existed relative to the choice between Neuner and Kuykendall, a petition was circulated by Rittner and others asking the Oregon senators to recommend the appointment of Louis E. Bean of Eugene in the event it was found impossible to break the deadlock.

FARM COMMITTEE REPORT TAKEN UP

along the lines of its constituted powers and responsibilities. Jealousies Deplored—The commission charged that "inter-departmental or inter-bureau jealousies" were seriously handicapping the administration on some departments and were causing a "dog in the manger" attitude that was resulting in the undue expansion of some governmental agencies and retarding the development of others.

Declaring agriculture was suffering from the country's lack of a unified banking system, the commission believed that remedy for this lay in measures to increase the relatively small membership in the federal reserve system and a modification of certain state banking laws.

The outlook for farm legislation this season was discussed with President Coolidge today by Chairman Snell of the house rules committee, which holds the whip hand over procedure on the house side of the capitol. Mr. Snell presented a long list of measures clamoring for attention, but Mr. Coolidge insisted that agricultural relief and the government reorganization bill should be kept out of the front.

"In many departments service and regulatory functions dealing with the same commodity or industry," the report states "are lodged in the same bureau, office or personnel. This has many disastrous effects. In the discharge of the regulatory functions, officials are sometimes required to adopt the judicial and prosecutory attitude. This inevitably leads to antagonism of interest between department officials and the individual citizens or organizations. Many of the instances of unsatisfactory administration touching agriculture brought to the attention of the conference have been clearly traceable to the feeling of antagonism, instead of community of interest.

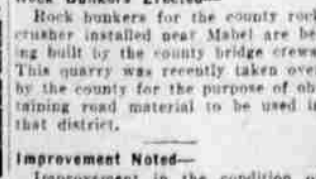
Separation Recommended—"The conference, therefore, recommends that in all branches of the government the service function and the regulatory function be separated as completely as possible in organization, personnel and action. "In addition to these general statements and recommendations, the conference has the following specific recommendations: "Rural credit and banking: No discussion of the agricultural problem would be complete without consideration of the banking problem in the agricultural districts for, as the president so aptly said, the difficulties of agriculture and the difficulties of the banking institutions in the agricultural districts, arise, to some extent at least from common causes. "Quarantine Problem "Plant and animal quarantine: Security of American agriculture from the invasion of foreign diseases and pests already established are of the highest importance. Increasing danger calls for increasing vigilance in policing all possible disease carriers. "Tax-Exemption Urged "Regarding tax exemption of cooperative organizations, the commission urged application of the exemption provision of the revenue act in a manner 'best calculated to secure the benefits contemplated by the law itself.' Any cooperative organization, it points out, should be eligible for tax exemption if its activities were restricted to serving its members and if its entire income was paid to them. "The report said the tariff commission has powers upon which to build an 'aggressive fact finding body' that should take the initiative in assembling information needed for a wise and efficient application of existing schedules," adding that "with such information at hand the president can call for investigation and receive a report in time to act with at least a fair degree of promptness in proclaiming modification of duties when commodities are suffering from the pressure of foreign competition."

Expansion of the crop reporting and market news service of the department of agriculture to include additional market and producing centers also was recommended.
