

MAYOR URGES NEW BRIDGE FOR RACE

That the three proposed wooden bridges to span the mill race at Porterson, Hilyard and Alder streets can be erected at an approximate cost of \$2000 each, is the opinion expressed today by Mayor E. B. Parks. The plans for the bridges are now being drawn by the city engineer.

"There has been some effort among residents of the Alder street district to have a concrete span erected there," Mayor Parks said. "We believe that the wooden bridge will be better than building concrete spans at the present time. The widening of Alder street is a possibility and we believe that it would better to wait for this development before planning a permanent concrete bridge," the mayor explained.

The bridges will be the full width of the street in all cases and will be of sturdy construction good for 15 years if necessary, Mayor Parks states.

Serum is Used.
A portion of the serum, frozen on its arrival, was thawed out yesterday afternoon and used on patients. Dr. Curtis Welch said he could not tell if anti-toxin had deteriorated until the effects were checked.

Word has been received from Fairbanks that extensive preparations have been made to prevent the freezing of 1,100,000 units of anti-toxin, shipped Saturday from Seattle on the steamship Alameda to Seward, and then to Nenana on the Alaska railroad.

Roy S. Darling, former navy flyer, who is agent of the department of justice at Fairbanks, and his mechanic, Ralph T. Mackie of Anchorage, are to take a biplane from Fairbanks to Nenana and then follow the United States signal corps telegraph miles. The tonnage of their plane is to be lined with fur and extra precautions taken to prevent the serum from freezing.

SERUM NOT DAMAGED
PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 3.—Freezing of anti-toxin units, rushed to Nome, Alaska, by dog team to combat the diphtheria epidemic, will have no effect upon its properties, Milton Campbell, president of the H. K. Mulford company, manufacturing chemists, declared today.

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BRIDGE BUILDING CONTRACT IS LET

M. O. Bensonette of Eugene received the contract for building the Ninth street bridge at last night's city council meeting. The bid accepted was \$11,230.75.

Two other bids on the bridge were opened, from the W. W. Head Construction company, for \$11,500, and Olds Construction company, \$11,800. Work will begin on the new bridge within the next two weeks, according to the city engineer, as it must be completed by May 1. It will be 50 feet wide, and will have three spans.

All paving petitions approved by the committee, were approved by the council, including Villard from Franklin to Fairmount, and Agate from Franklin to Nineteenth, calling for 36-foot parking down the center of each street.

February 17 at 2 o'clock hearings will be held on the proposed opening of eight Eugene streets. Those are: Thirteenth avenue, Jefferson to Madison street; Fifteenth avenue, one-half block west of Lawrence street; Ninth avenue, Van Buren to Chambers street; Tyler, Fifth to Sixth avenue; Tenth avenue, Polk to Chambers street; Polk street, Seventh to Eleventh avenue; Second avenue, Madison to Jefferson street.

Bond issues to be submitted to the people at the coming election will total approximately \$550,000, it was learned last night. The city decided to ask for \$20,000 more in intercession money, in addition to the \$20,000 held up by litigation.

C. A. McClain, superintendent of the water board, spoke on the projects contemplated by the board in requesting \$200,000—building a 30-inch pipe line six miles to Hayden bridge, three million gallon reservoir to replace the present one on Skinner butte, purchase of a new pump and construction of approximately two miles more of mains.

Assessors' Views On Changes Asked

Advice on the opinion of the state tax assessors on senate bill 42 which provides for changes in the assessment laws has been asked of Rep. E. Keeney, Lane assessor and chairman of the legislative committee of the assessors' organization. The proposed law provides for an annual tax of one-half mill to provide a fund for the purpose of assessing all land in the state according to classifications.
