

ABYLON MUSEUM UNCOVERED; RARE OBJECTS OBTAINED

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 4.—A museum, the property of the daughter of the late king of Babylon, who ruled the sixth century, B. C., has been uncovered by the joint archaeological expedition of the British museum and the University of Pennsylvania at Ur, the Chaldees, according to the December report of the scientists made while in London and Philadelphia last night.

The scientists who are digging in the buried city of Amurrah in ancient Mesopotamia, reported that the museum contained objects dating as far back as 2500 B. C.

Leonard Woolley, head of the expedition, recounted what has been accomplished at the hall of justice, the E. D. Dulala-Mahk, the other site which the archaeologists are working.

History Worked Out.
"We have worked out the history of the building from Nabonidus," he said, "king of Babylon in the sixth century, B. C., back through the reigns of his sons, Bel-Sin, a hundred years before by Kuri-Galzu, the king, in the sixteenth century, by Sargon, king of Assyria, six hundred years before that, to its original foundation, by Bel-Sin of Ur about 2500 B. C. Even below the walls of Bel-Sin we have come upon bricks of a more primitive sort bearing a name, but marked with two finger marks deeply impressed to hold the mortar, a record of the shadowy kings of the second dynasty of Ur who may have reigned some 2800 years before Christ."

"From an inscription preserved in a museum at Yale we know that the last king of Babylon, Nabonidus, following ancient precedent, consecrated his daughter, Bel-Shalti-Namir, as high priestess of the moon god, Ur, and built an E-Gig-Lar, or, later for her dwelling, and incidentally, he lays down the most admirable plan for her guidance."

Acted as Convent.
"The ground plan of the place appears perfectly to the word 'cloister' and in Yale inscription and there can be no doubt we have the actual plan of the priestess."

"The contents of the building were less important than its character. Shal materials, writing exercises, seemed to show that the religious houses then as now, had their own life, and the daughter of Nabonidus, himself a well-known astronomer, appears to have kept a museum in her convent, for there were found in the ruins a large number of objects of such different dates that it is hard on any other theory to account for their presence altogether in one of the latest period."

CONTROVERSY OVER AIRCRAFT'S VALUE TAKES NEW ANGLE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—The controversy among army and navy officers over the value of aircraft took on new ramifications today when Representative Perkins, republican of New Jersey announced that three navy officers had requested the house aircraft committee not to summon them because they could not give their honest views for fear of being disciplined.

On the army side, the row already has said in a request from Secretary Weeks that Brigadier General Mitchell, assistant chief of the air service, explain certain statements he made to committees in congress in support of increased aviation facilities.

General Mitchell declared that certain officers were afraid to "tell the truth" about aircraft through a fear of being disciplined, "indirectly" through transfer to less favored posts.
Representative Perkins would not reveal the names of the navy officers who asked not to be summoned, but he said that one of them had declared if he testified what he believed—"well, Guam is a long distance away."
He said the request had come to him as chief examiner of the aircraft committee. He also declared it would be an "outrage" should General Mitchell fail of reappointment as assistant chief of the air service, and thus automatically revert to the rank of colonel. Pending his reply to Secretary Weeks' request for information about his testimony, a decision of the general's reappointment is held in abeyance.

"I propose if possible," Mr. Perkins added, "to determine to what extent terrorization prevents officers from telling the truth to congress."
