## OREGON MEDICAL SCHOOL SEEKING AID FROM STATE

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Feb. 4.—Among a large number of petitions heard by the ways and means committee last night were representatives of the University of Oregon, and Oregon Agricultural college. Dr. R. R. Dillehunt, head of the medical school of the state university, appeared in behalf of the desired \$61,000 appropriation for maintenance of the Doernbecher memorial hospital for children. The sum of \$200,000 has been left for establishment of the hospital.

Mrs. George T. Gerlinger, C. C. Colt and Major W. S. Gilbert, all members of the board of regents of the university, also spoke for the appropriation.

Representatives of Oregon Agricultural college appeared in behalf of various activities of that institution for which appropriations are asked. J. S. Landers and Mrs. Louise Palmer Webber spoke for the Monmouth normal school appropriations.

## BRONZE TABLET TO PIONEERS PLANNED

Plans for the erection of a bronze tablet in memory and honor of the early pioneers of Lane county are being discussed among members of the Lane County Pioneers association, according to George Melvin Miller, secretary of the association. The organization now has a membership of 544, requirements being that each member have completed 50 years residence in Oregon. "The names of many of the early pioneers of Lane are fast fading from memory and it is believed that some permanent memorial be arranged for these people who figured so prominently in the early history of the county," Mr. Miller said today.

## SENATE ASKED TO CONSIDER RESULTS OF PACT AT PARIS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Without undertaking to discuss directly Secretary Hughes' reply regarding the Paris reparations agreement, Senator Johnson, republican, California, one of the irreconcilables, asked the senate today to consider "the grave and important questions which have been presented by what happened at Paris."

"From that conference," he said, "two important questions come to us that some time, some day, by some senate and by some American people, must be decided."

The first and foremost question, Senator Johnson added, is presented by the question of the power of the executive branch of the government to determine without the consent of congress what should be done with the debts of the nation.

"I am more than deeply concerned with the possibilities that may come from what was done by the United States at Paris," the California senator continued. "I recognize the position of the secretary of state. I take it that when the secretary of state said the United States is neither legally nor morally bound, he expresses his present intention."

The senator added, however, that administrations change and that he felt some one "ought, in congress of the United States, to render what service he can in avoidance of perils that may lie ahead."

For five years, he said, he had trod "the rough road" against foreign entanglements.

"I shall continue," he said, "to travel the rough road of the demand that America live her own life in her own way without entanglements with Europe or European nations."

The California senator then declared that for 2-1-4 per cent of "speculative reparations," America had risked the unity and good will of European nations.

"We have traded amity and good will for perplexity, confusion, ill will and hostility," he said. "That is what we got at Paris for 2-1-4 per cent of something that may never be paid. That is the price we got for changing America's policy, if we did change it, as Europeans say we did."

numb all over, but I felt warmer, after I was covered. I couldn't move and was getting awfully weak.

"Sunday, after, attempt after attempt to save me had failed, I began to lose confidence. I prayed continuously. Somehow I wiggled a toe. Pains shot through me. I don't know how long it was before my brother came in with something to eat, but it seemed ages. I had some whiskey and it warmed me up a whole lot. I could talk for a while, but it wasn't long before I was unconscious or asleep. I don't know which.

"Tuesday morning, I thought to myself, 'four days down here and no nearer freedom than I was the first day. How will I get out or—' I couldn't think of it. I have faced death before. It doesn't frighten me. But it is so long. Oh, God, be merciful!

"Tuesday night I felt better than at any time since I was caught. I was mighty weak a few hours ago—mighty weak. So many plans have been tried, so many people and so little has been done that I am beginning to get fearful again. I keep praying. I say 'Oh, Lord, dear Lord, gracious Lord, Jesus all powerful, get me out if it is in the will, but You will be done.' I know I am going to get out. I feel like it. Something tells me to be brave, and, I am going to be.

"Now, fellow, (this is what he calls me) you better go out and get warm! But come back. You are small and I believe you are going to get me out. I want you to tell everybody outside that I love everyone of them and I'm happy because so many are trying to help me. Tell them I am not going to give up. That I am going to fight and be patient and never forget them. You go out now, but don't leave me too long. I want you with me and I'll keep helping all I can to move some of this rock."

## Representative is Secretly Indicted

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 4.—Philip Hammond, representative in the state legislature from Clackamas county, was secretly indicted by the federal grand jury here yesterday charged with accepting an excessive fee as an attorney for drawing up an application for insurance under the national war risk insurance act. He came voluntarily today to the office of Assistant United States Attorney Stearns and furnished \$1000 bond. Arraignment was postponed until after the legislature adjourns.

Hammond was accused of accepting a fee of \$100 when the law at the time the application was made provided for a fee of \$3. The case involved was the application of Thomas and Mary J. run by the Anti-Saloon league," he said. "I run it. True, I have consulted with the Anti-Saloon league and with friends of prohibition."

In his talk at the public hearing Monday night, Governor Pierce, had referred to a large number of prosecutions resulting from the \$1500 in state money turned over to Weinberg for his Anti-Saloon league investigation. Senator Hare questioned the governor about this, reminding him that previous testimony showed not a single prosecution had resulted.

"I can't recall a particular case," answered the governor, "but it opened up the Yamhill case and other cases in the Willamette valley."
