

EDDIE COLLINS TO SEEK PENNANT FOR HIS CHICAGO TEAM

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—A first division club and possibly a pennant contender is the aim of Eddie Collins, new manager of the Chicago American league team. If enthusiasm and hope are any criterion the White Sox may prove to be the "dark horse" in the 1925 pennant drive. Collins acquired the club "will finish where it belongs."

Four of the recent American league pennant winners were piloted by first base managers.

Collins is pleased with his club, and is depending upon two men, pitcher Ted Blankenship and outfielder Johnny Mott. With Falk and Hooper occupying the other outfield berths, the new pilot believes his troubles have been solved. He also has Ardenhouse and Eish as substitute catchers.

The majorstop position, the weakest in the club last season, seems to be well cared for with like Davis, former Columbus American association player. Collins believes he has a strong line of substitutes.

There are four left handed pitchers on the roster and Collins is hopeful of developing one who will be able to take his turn with the right handers. The southpaws are Mike Cuyegre, Foreman, Davenport and Ash. The right handers on the roster are Faber, Thurston, Robertson, Connally, Lyons, Blankenship, Leverette, Mangum and Stearns.

Willie Kamm, \$100,000 contract league third baseman who suffered a slump last season is expected to command the hot corner. Earl Sheely will return to the initial sack. Collins will return to the keystone sack.

Ray Schick and Clyde Grouse will probably do the bulk of the catching. Billy Lauder, former baseball coach, has been signed as coach as assistant to Collins.

The club as a whole will take on a college atmosphere. In addition to the collegiate coach and Manager Collins, there are five or more men with university experience. These include Charley Robertson, Bib Falk, "Red" Faber, Harry Hooper from California and Ted Lyons.
