

PRETTY GIRLS TO BE HEADLINERS ON PROGRAM OF VETS

Pretty girls by the dozens—dancers, singers and entertainers—will be the chief attraction at the annual Lane county veterans' reunion February 12, it is announced. Girls from Seattle, Portland, San Francisco and Longwood will be imported for the occasion, the committee declares, and a particular invitation is being extended to all veterans who have been paid-headed since the war.

It is expected to stage the biggest reunion ever seen in Oregon, says George E. Love, chairman of the committee on arrangements. "You may imagine we must have plenty of acts to keep interest alive from 1:30 to sunrise. Everything will be strictly within the law, as city and county officials are to be guests of honor."

Arrangements are being made to entertain 1200 veterans, according to Mr. Love, who says that Eugene, Cottage Grove, Springfield, Junction City and Noti merchants are contributing heavily with cigars, cigarettes and food for the celebration. Two orchestras will furnish music during the night.

PLANS FOR SCHOOL WILL BE DISCUSSED

Tentative plans for the building of a new school house in district 28 at River View on the Pacific highway near Junction City will be discussed at a meeting of the board of directors of the district to be held this evening, according to Chester Edwards who was a business visitor at the office of the county superintendent of schools today. It is proposed to erect a building of three rooms to replace the present building of two rooms which has been in use for many years. The last time there was a vote on the building of a new school the proposal lost by but two votes. Expectations are that there will be a large increase in the number of pupils in the district soon as many large tracts are shortly to be cut up into smaller farms and sold. This is expected to bring many new residents there, it is pointed out.

Bank Buys Block

About three years ago the Bank of Commerce purchased the Matlock block at the southwest corner of Eighth avenue and Willamette street. This building was bought as a site for a new bank building, according to announcement made at that time by C. D. Rorer, president. Plans for the remodeling of the building have been pending for some time.

No announcement was made as to the purchase price of the deal just closed for the Castle theater property but the entire transaction is understood to have been more than \$100,000.

MAJOR GJEDSTED CHARGES GRAFT

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 5.—Charges of petty grafting of state funds by Adjutant General George A. White, of the Oregon national guard, are made in affidavit submitted to Governor Walter M. Pierce, by Major Charles E. Gjedsted, until recently White's chief office assistant. A few days ago Gjedsted resigned, charging White with irregularities in the conduct of affairs of his office.

In charges filed with the governor he alleges that on certain dates in 1921, White claimed reimbursement for traveling expenses from the state on use of his own car when in reality he used a car furnished the state military department by the federal government and Gjedsted further charges that 1924 the adjutant general caused his office force to juggle accounts of the department in connection with charges for room rent and meals for certain national guard officers.

Good Progress on Road Grading Seen

Although weather conditions have not been of the best there has been satisfactory progress on the county road improvement between Maple and Fiddle creeks in western Lane, according to Andrew Miller, supervisor in charge of the project for the county. The grading work is being done under contract by the Theodore Knudson company of Portland. This is the only large road project under way for the county during the winter as all other jobs have been held up.

Hulk of Coaba is Aground on Beach

ILWACO, Wash., Feb. 5.—The hulk of the steam schooner Coaba, which has been adrift near the mouth of the Columbia river since Sunday night, when the vessel was abandoned by her crew, drifted ashore this morning at Ocean Park, north of Long Beach, Wash. The spot where the high tide landed the derelict was near the wreck of the steamer Alice, which has been lying on the beach for some years.
