

# OHIO DEAN FINDS STRYCHNINE WHEN RE-CHECK IS MADE

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 5.—(AP)—A new bottle of strychnine, the presence of which was unknown, was discovered last night by Dean Clair A. Dye of the college of pharmacy at Ohio State University, in a re-check of the dispensary stock.

The bottle contained perhaps 75 grains of the poison.

Dr. Dye, unable to sleep because of the worry occasioned by the death of two students, one of whom is known to have died of strychnine poisoning, returned to the dispensary shortly after midnight and rechecked the entire stock. On a shelf out of sight in a corner he found the half filled bottle of strychnine.

How or when the poison got there, Dr. Dye does not know. He has been in connection with the college of pharmacy for more than 30 years and he says that he has no recollection of ever having seen any such bottle of strychnine before.

**QUESTIONING PLANNED**

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Columbus police today planned to question Ohio university students who last week worked in the pharmacy dispensary from which capsules, some of which contained poison, were used to fill prescriptions written by the university student health service and which caused the death of at least one student and serious illness of several others. With every supply of the poison on the campus accounted for, the task the investigators faced was a three-fold one: to discover who gave out the capsules containing the poison instead of ones containing quinine, which closely resembles the poison; to find out, if possible, the motive, if any, underlying the act; and to uncover the source of supply of the poison.

Belief that the poison was intentionally placed in the capsules was strengthened yesterday by the finding of definite traces of the drug in the stomach of David L. Pusken, Canton, Ohio, senior, who died Sunday.

ers who composed the detail made their report to Brigadier-General H. H. Denhardt, in charge of the work and Denhardt summoned W. D. Funkhouser, head of the geological department of the University of Kentucky, who arrived yesterday.

**Cave Re-Entered.**

After a conference, it was agreed that the miners should re-enter the cave for a second observation with a view of determining whether the movement of rock could be stopped.

Meanwhile, those in charge of the work withheld knowledge of what had occurred.

An hour later the miners reappeared at the surface and hurried to General Denhardt and his conferees in one of the tents near the entrance. The floor had continued to rise during the hour, they reported.

A third trip revealed that the slow rising had continued and when the miners were returned from their fourth underground visit they told General Denhardt that the passage way had been completely sealed. There had been no more rock falls or cave-ins, it was stated. The swelling apparently had lifted solid rock from the floor to the roof of the cavern.

**Collins' Death Feared.**

This action closed the passageway for a long distance and may have crushed Collins if it extended that far. Inasmuch as a considerable portion of the cave leading from the entrance toward the prisoner still remains undisturbed, however, belief was expressed that Collins might still be alive.

The movement took place just beyond that part of the cavern which had been timbered by rescuers.

The first three explorations by the miners required about one hour each. Considerably more time elapsed during the fourth visit, however, and the alarm of those on the surface increased each minute until the first man's light appeared in the cavity downward from the entrance.

**Equipment Sought.**

No one among those in charge of the work at Sand cave was able to suggest where the nearest mining machinery might be located. Major Cherry did not make known his destination when he hurriedly drove away for more equipment.

Preliminary plans for sinking the shaft, evolved in consultation with coal miners who arrived from Muhlenburg county during the night and who made the four early morning trips, called for a mine from the top of the hill at a position not far distant from where Collins is thought to be pinned.

It was estimated the shaft would be from 50 to 75 feet deep before any of the cavern beneath were tapped.

Whether the position chosen would strike Sand cave was a matter of speculation. If it does not, then a tunnel from the depth where the cave is believed to lie will be undertaken.

# FEDERAL CHARGE AGAINST CLEAVER ORDERED DROPPED

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 5.—The federal indictment against George L. Cleaver, state prohibition commissioner in connection with his raid in December on the British steamer London Merchant, was dismissed today by Federal Judge C. E. Benn, on motion of Assistant United States Attorney Allan G. Byron, who said the department of justice had ordered the prosecution dropped.

Judge Benn, before entering the order of dismissal inquired upon what grounds the department of justice reached its decision not to press the case, and Mr. Byron said it was because Mr. Cleaver had acted in good faith.

The indictment charged Cleaver with violation of the treaty with Great Britain regarding liquor traffic.

# Negro University Students Charged With Inciting Riot

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 5.—Five students of Fisk University, negro institution, were held in jail today on charges of inciting a riot with Dr. F. A. McKenzie, president of the university, named as prosecutor, following a demonstration by 100 students, against the president last night. Others taking part in the demonstration were given opportunity to sign a paper condemning the disorder, or to leave school and get out of Nashville today.

The disorder was said to have been the result of Dr. McKenzie's insistence in an address that the rule prohibiting male and female students from walking together on the campus or streets must be strictly observed. The students began firing pistols from the windows of Livingstone hall last night. Later they went out on the campus and Dr. McKenzie said, engaged in various kinds of disorder. Police restored order.

# Commission Opposed To Gooding Measure

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—A majority of the members of the interstate commerce commission are opposed to the Gooding bill, which would prohibit the charging of a higher railroad rate for a short haul than for a long one over the same route, it was reported Mr. Eech today informed the house commerce committee.

Eight members opposed the measure, he said, one favored it and two were non-committal.
