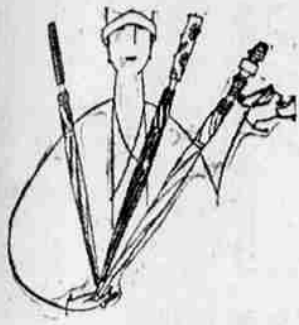

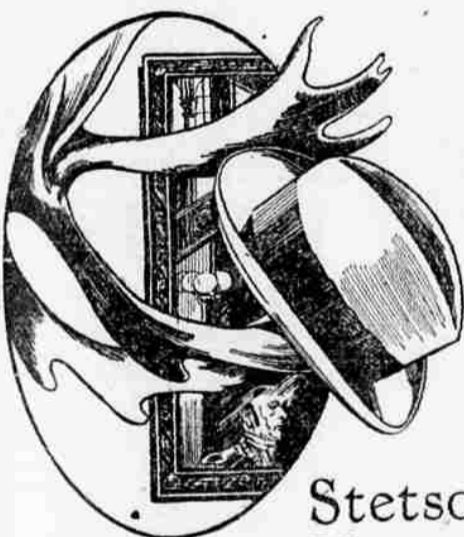

Friends of O'Shea Take Stand in his Defense at Klamath

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 6.—Friends of John O'Shea took the witness stand in circuit court today, seeking to establish an alibi for his movements on the night of January 2, when it is alleged, he participated in the robbery of a gambling house which resulted in the slaying of Oscar Erickson. O'Shea's trial on a charge of first-degree murder was hearing a close this afternoon and the case is expected to reach the jury some time tomorrow. Several intimate friends of the defendant testified they were with him in a local pool room shortly after 12 o'clock on the night of the robbery and slaying. John Taylor, confessed participant in the holdup, has testified that O'Shea was with the others from shortly after 11:30 that night, until after the crime had been committed and the loot divided a short distance from the city.

OLD AUTO PLATES TO CAUSE ARRESTS

Arrest all persons in Eugene or Lane county driving automobiles with 1924 license plates.

These are the orders received by the sheriff, chief of police, city judge, justice of the peace, district attorney and city and county traffic officers today from Sam A. Koxer, secretary of state. Congestion of business in the motor vehicle division of the department of state has cleared up, and licenses are issued at once, says Mr. Koxer, and there is now no valid cause for any motor vehicle operating his car without 1925 plates.

In case where motor vehicle owners desire to operate before receiving a permanent license, they should obtain temporary tags, it is stated. No arrests have been made in Eugene thus far, although several machines with red license plates are still being driven. Police officers have notified the drivers personally, and in the event that the violation continues arrests may be expected, it is stated.

HIGH SCHOOL BILL LOOMS AS POINT FOR MAIN FIGHT

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Feb. 6.—Senator Eddy's bill, which limits the power of election of studies by high school students and makes provision for greater emphasis on fundamentals, loomed today as the main fight in the senate, and Eddy had just completed an hour's argument for the measure when the noon recess was taken. In his speech Eddy attacked the course of study in Oregon high school curriculums and those in control of education as being unperturbed to new ideas or reform. Eddy asserted that he wanted to get out of the curriculum certain "trash" which is not trash fundamentally, but is trash because it is taught so superficially that it only gives a smattering of knowledge and in no way trains the mind. "If my boy or girl," he said, "is to imbibe socialism, communism or any other hellish ism from the pit, they will have to get them from some source other than the high school if I have power to keep them out of the schools." He scored the practice of placing in the high school courses the works of Scott Nearing, H. G. Wells and Jack London.

PORT BILL VETO FAILS IN EFFECT

from the legislature to the executive and hence the port bill passed last week over-rides the will of the people of the district. Gives Recommendation In conclusion the governor recommended that a bill be passed providing that hereafter the Port of Portland commissioners be elected by the voters of the district, pointing out that this is the procedure pursued by other ports in the state and pronouncing it the correct and sound procedure. In the message the governor also explains why he appointed five new commissioners to the port on January 27, instead of waiting until the terms of the old commissioners expired by stating that the purpose was to avoid strife that he believed would jeopardize other legislation. The executive assailed the lobbying activities of the commercial fishing interests. He attributed the passage of the bill to the activities of these commercial fishing interests and asserted that for years past they have coerced the legislature into defending beneficial legislation. The message reads in part: "Twenty-two years ago I first became a member of the Oregon senate. Well do I remember two very disturbing elements at that session which prevented proper consideration of legislative measures. The first was the election of a United States senator by the legislature and the other was the election of commissioners for the Port of Portland by the legislature. "Honest citizens have often wondered why the Oregon legislature is called upon to decide who shall be the commissioners for the Port of Portland. "The Port of Portland is now a branch of the state government; it is a local affair, a sub-division, comparable to an irrigation district, a school district, or a city within the state. What consideration should be given to an irrigation district, a school district or a city continually asking the legislature for more than thirty years to name its commissioners or directors. Especially when such demand was accompanied by a threat that any refusal would result in other needed legislation, would not be passed. "May I remind the members of this august body that a great politician in the last national election by a vigorous campaign against a candidate who sought to make the legislative branch of our national government superior to the judiciary. "The same national principle is involved in the proposed legislation of senate bill number 86. It is clearly a usurpation of executive functions by the legislative branch of our state government. As governor I refuse to be a party to such illegal seizure of executive power. "In 1921 the legislature enacted a law transferring to the governor the appointment of commissioners for the Port of Portland. This law was referred to the voters of the port district at a special election held on June 7, 1921, and by an overwhelming majority the people of the port district sustained that law. Bill number 86 clearly overrides and sets at naught the will of the people as expressed at that election. "For months the public press of the state has carried bold headlines asserting the legislature would strip the executive of all the appointive and administrative powers possible. Immediately upon the assembling of the legislature a systematic and careful canvass was made of its members. Pledges were enacted and made to carry out this program. I have been informed that the original program was to introduce one bill, stripping the executive of all appointive power, and almost enough votes were pledged to enact such a law over the veto of the governor. 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
