University of Oregon will hold its first spring football workout this afternoon, starting at 4 o'clock. Richard Shore (Dick) Smith, new coach, has called out the kickers, centers, ends and backs for this afternoon. The tackles and guards will not be called until Batt Spellman, line coach, arrives.

Smith will spend the first week or 10 days in selecting his kickers and centers. After that he will work only with the punters, he thinks can make the grade and try to work them into some backfield position, quarter, preferably.

Although 14 or 15 lettermen are expected for the 1925 squad, Smith is not at all satisfied with his prospects and said that because of his heavy schedule, which includes Idaho, Washington, Oregon Aggies, and two California colleges, Stanford and University of California, he wishes to develop at least two men for each position.

Smith is particularly desirous of developing a speedy center—one who can think fast and snap the ball back quickly and accurately. The pivot man, according to the new mentor, is the most important man on the team, and if he is slow, it slows up the rest of the team.
