

EUGENE MAY GET AIR PATROL BASE

Unless present plans of the United States air service are changed, Eugene will be the only airplane base for forest air patrol north of California the coming season.

This became known here today, when the announcement was received from Washington, D. C., that Eugene was to be the principal northern station for air patrols on the coast because of the foresight of its citizens in providing a municipal landing field for airplanes.

Because, also, funds will be limited this year to \$50,000 for air patrols of national forest, it is believed that this city will be the only airplane base operating north of California.

Senator McNary introduced an amendment to the agricultural bill, approved by both houses, making the \$50,000 available for supplies and equipment outside of planes and personnel which are furnished by the war department. The season's program, it is stated, will depend in large part upon what the war department will do in supplying planes and pilots.

This means that the \$50,000 appropriation will be spent for air patrol in Oregon and California.

SCHOOL RENT PLAN WILL BE DISCUSSED

Whether plans for the renting of rooms near the grade schools to take care of any increase in registration at the opening of the second semester will be made will be decided at the meeting of the school board this evening, according to announcement today of Rev. Frederick G. Jennings, chairman.

The report on increase in registration which will probably be ready this evening will be a basis on which to work," Mr. Jennings said. If the increase is such that there will be congestion at some of the schools the renting plan will be adopted, the chairman states.

The question of installation of hot fuel heating systems in the local schools will also be discussed at the meeting tonight.

RESCUE WORK AT CAVE IS RUSHED

beating at the rate of 20 times a minute.

Lane said Floyd was breathing and his heart beating 18 to 21 times a minute.

The test was made on the wire which has been placed around Collins' chest last week by rescuers.

SHAFT GOES DEEPER

CAVE CITY, Ky., Feb. 2.—(AP)—The shaft through which rescuers hope to reach Floyd Collins in Sand cave was approximately 30 feet deep at 9 a. m. today, four days after it was started. At the present rate the level where Collins is thought to be will not be reached before Thursday or Friday.

Another obstacle today had added another obstacle to the efforts of men to rescue Collins from the grip of a boulder trap in the depths of Sand cave, sending torrents of rain last night with a promise of more today.

Despite precautions of keep water out of the perpendicular shaft timed at Collins' prison, seepage crept in to the bottom of the shaft and added heavily to the burden of the volunteer diggers. They kept doggedly at it with some slight increase in hourly progress as the tenth day of Collins' imprisonment ended at 10 o'clock this morning. The shaft then was less than half way to Collins, 60 or 70 feet below the surface.

Gas Is Tricked

When rock slides blocked the natural tunnel of Sand cave Thursday, the use of pungent but harmless gas was seized upon as a means of finding the back end of Collins' latest cave, but the experiment, tried last night with bananas oil, was unsuccessful. Despite a strong down draft of air into Sand cave no trace of the odor could be located in any nearby cave.

With most of the spectacular, frenzied striving to free Collins a clouded chapter and all efforts centered on the monotonous toil of digging and hoisting, new theories began to develop about the situation until they were almost as thick as the outstanding incident in the drama.

Theories Advanced.

The principal groups of theories fall into three classes—that the imprisonment of Collins by a rock on his leg is a publicity hoax; that enemies finding him trapped caused the walls of the cave to collapse so he could not be rescued alive or possibly caused the slide which trapped him; and the most generally accepted theory, Collins' own story in the early days of the rescue work that he really was accidentally trapped after discovering a cavern more beautiful than any yet found in the region.

One of the active rumors of Sunday night was that Circuit Judge Basil Richardson of Glasgow, would call a grand jury to investigate the probability of a publicity hoax. Judge Richardson said he had never thought of such a thing and didn't believe it was a hoax.

INQUIRY TO BE HELD

CAVE CITY, Ky., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Circumstances surrounding the trapping of Floyd Collins in Sand cave and the efforts of volunteer rescuers to release him will be made the subject of a military court of inquiry, Brigadier General H. H. Denhardt, in command of guardsmen here, announced today.

"I hope by this court of inquiry to lay at rest all suspicions, whisperings of the effort to block rescue work, and rumors that Collins' entrapment was not genuine," said General Denhardt. The commander said his plan for the military investigation had been sanctioned by Governor Fields and Adjutant-General Kehoe.

The entire testimony and proceedings will be recorded in a complete stenographic record. The court will be conducted in a tent at the scene of the rescue work near the entrance to Sand cave. General Denhardt deemed it advisable to hold the hearing before Collins' fate has been determined because of the difficulty of bringing the desired witnesses to Sand cave after the work has ended and the rescuers returned to their homes.

Longview Booster Tells of Building

Six hundred new homes this year and the erection of the second unit of the Long-Hell lumber plant are among the building projects planned for Longview, Wash., "The Wonder City," is the enthusiastic report of Leith Abbott, graduate of the University of Oregon school of journalism, who is now directing publicity at the new Washington city. Mr. Abbott was a week-end visitor here. A new rail depot with facilities for a city of 50,000, the raising of \$200,000 by popular subscription for a new hospital, and a fund of \$1,000,000 given by R. A. Long to be spent for the city within the next five years, are a few other items of interest in Longview, Mr. Abbott states.

Auto Tag Sales in Lane are Started

Temporary automobile license tags for all car owners can now be purchased at the office of the Lane county sheriff, according to announcement today. The sale of the temporary tags was restricted to new cars only since December 24 when the sale opened here. The demand for temporary tags, although not so heavy as last year is showing some improvement and Saturday a total of 22 were issued, according to Miss Beulah Weavry, in charge of the auto license sales.

Services Held for Mrs. Ruth Johnson

Mrs. Ruth Westfall Johnson, wife of J. Lewis Johnson, died at the Pacific Christian hospital, Eugene, Ore., February 3, 1925, a few hours after giving birth to a twin baby. One of the babies, a boy, Richard Jonathan, died about the same time as the mother. Mrs. Johnson seemed to be recovering nicely when she suddenly began to fall rapidly.

Ruth Westfall was born at Fulton, South Dakota, May 10, 1894, where she resided with her parents until 1909, when the family came to Eugene. In January, 1911, she was graduated from the Eugene high school, and taught the remainder of the school year at Walker, Oregon. She attended the University of Oregon and was graduated with honors in mathematics in 1917.

During the war she served as student nurse at Camp Lewis, Washington, and was honored with a life membership in the American Legion after her discharge from duty. Since the fall of 1919 she had been instructor in mathematics at the Eugene high school until the present school term.

On May 6, 1921, she was married to J. Lewis Johnson and has resided with him since that time on their ranch near the city. Beside her husband, Mrs. Johnson is survived by her baby daughter, Margaret Amy, her mother, Mrs. Amy Westfall, and two sisters, Mrs. Gretta Dalcourt of Trenton, Nebraska, and Mrs. Beulah South of Eugene.

She was a member of the Presbyterian church, Alpha Phi Sorority, P. E. O. Sisterhood, Order of the Eastern Star, Phi Beta Kappa, national honorary scholarship fraternity, American Association of University Women, of which organization she was for two years the secretary. Scroll and Script and Mortar Board, and represented Alpha Phi as alumnae representative on the Pan-Hellenic council. During her senior year she was president of the campus Red Cross, and was a leader in the campus Y. W. C. A. work throughout her college course.

Funeral services were held at the Veach chapel on February 7, with Rev. A. H. Saunders in charge, and interment was made in the Hope Abbey Mausoleum.
