

LOCAL FIRM IS ROBBED OF \$1000 WORTH OF HIDES

Raw furs and hides, valued at approximately \$1000, were stolen last night from the Willamette Hide and Fur company at 175 Eighth avenue west. The theft, discovered this morning by H. M. Miller, one of the proprietors, was reported to the police department, and officers are working to solve the case today.

Twenty heavier skins, valued at \$200, were the chief loss. Among the other hides taken were:

Seven foxes, valued at \$10 each; five mink, \$7 each; five bobcats, \$5 each; 10 skunks, \$1.50 each; and five coons, \$5 each.

The hides stolen were part of a consignment, valued at more than \$20,000, which Mr. Miller expects to take to New York the latter part of this month. Eight martin hides, worth more than \$250, hanging above the desk in the office at midway down the building, were overlooked by the thief, Mr. Miller reported.

"We never keep expensive hides in our Eighth street headquarters," said Mr. Miller today. "We usually take them to our warehouse. Yesterday was a heavy day, though, and I am sure that the thief was someone who had been in the building, and noticed that I was busy and was likely not to take the valuable hides home."

FERRY OPERATION BIDS ARE OPENED BY COUNTY COURT

Bids for the operation of the county ferry across the Siuslaw were opened today by the county court but no bid was accepted as further consideration of the matter was desired, was the announcement. It is understood that C. L. Colter with a low bid of \$60 per month for the operation of the ferry will get the contract if no change is made in the opinion of the court.

The other bids submitted for the ferry were: T. E. Furnish, \$125; John W. Tanner, \$130.50; James Allard, \$100; Robert Baker, \$145; Jack Isom, \$75.

The successful bidder will be required to post a bond of \$300, according to the specification asking for the bids. The ferry which will operate between Florence and Glenada will be started within the next two weeks according to the plans of the court. Foot passengers will be carried free and a charge of not over 50 cents will be made for automobiles and other vehicles.

St. Helens Will Gain Paper Mill, Is Announcement

OREGON CITY, Ore., Feb. 10.—Plans will be started at once for the erection of a \$2,500,000 paper mill at St. Helens, Ore., that when finally completed will have a capacity for manufacturing from 300 to 400 tons of craft paper daily, it was announced today by Willard B. Hawley, Jr., whose statements were substantiated by his father, W. B. Hawley, Sr., heads of the Hawley Pulp and Paper company, both of whom arrived in Oregon City today from San Francisco.

The mill will be built in units, the first unit to have a capacity of 50 tons daily, and will employ about 350 men.

Interested with the Hawleys in the building of this mill at St. Helens will be the McCormick Steamship line, the \$2,500,000 stock of that company being controlled by the Hawleys and the McCormicks.

SUGGESTIONS OF FARM GROUP ARE GRANTED HEARING

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(AP)—While methods of carrying its recommendations into effect were being assailed today before a house committee, members of President Coolidge's agriculture commission appeared before the senate agricultural committee to explain their suggestions.

B. F. Yoakum, chairman of the Farmer-to-Consumer league occupied the stand before the house agriculture committee, and he delivered a vigorous onslaught against the Williams bill, designed to carry out recommendations of the senate, at the same time urging the Curtis-Aswell measure for a system of cooperative marketing agencies.

Farmer Views Differ

Before the senate committee, W. M. Jarden, a member of the conference, declared the recommendations were based on views widely held by farmers and followed testimony of authorities on agriculture.

"It is time for the farmers to get behind some plan and stop fighting each other," he declared, adding that "the recommendations will relieve agriculture and will make a start toward permanent farm relief."

Senator McNary Speaks

Senator McNary, republican, Oregon, challenged the statement of the witness that the Oregon Prune Growers' association was an example of successful cooperative marketing. He asserted he was one of the largest prune growers in the west and head of one of the biggest cooperative organizations, and "as a matter of fact, the Oregon Prune Growers' association now is on the rocks," because they tried to spread out too far.

Senator Harrison, democrat of Mississippi, questioned the witness on the source of the information that led to such drastic recommendations for the revision of the protective tariff, he declared he was prepared to fight any expansion of the tariff.
