### City Saves Money By Working Hoboes

The city's policy of "ragging" hoboes who are caught begging on the streets is not only saving the administration money but is making Eugene unsafe for knights of the road, it is announced by officials. The minimum sentence given to prisoners is a fine of \$20 or 10 days on the street.

At present nine men are working on city streets. The cost of their food averages \$8.10 daily, giving the city a day's work at a cost of 90 cents per man.

Although the expense of feeding the prisoners is at present charged to the police department, it is understood that the cost will be prorated among the street, building and police departments.

Most of the men now serving vagabond sentences finished their work today, and were dismissed. Joe Wagner, fined \$20 this morning, was added to the street gang.

### HIGHWAY USAGE BILL ADVANCES

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Feb. 11.—Establishment of the principle of commercial vehicles paying for use of highways in proportion to their traffic and business over them is effected in house bill 413 passed by the house yesterday afternoon with four dissenting votes.

House bill 413 is a substitute worked out of house bills 19 and 59 by the roads and highways committee. The most important element of it provides for a tax of three-eighths of a mill per seat or ton capacity multiplied by the number of miles travelled by buses and trucks. This tax is over and above all other regular fees charged.

Permits for operation must be obtained from the public service commission.

Of the funds derived from this additional source of revenue, one quarter would go to the various counties in proportion to the license fees paid by machine owners. The other three quarters would go to highway construction and maintenance.

### High School Plans Lincoln Program

Brief addresses on various phases of Abraham Lincoln's life will be delivered at Eugene high school tomorrow morning by speakers from the high school class in oral English. These students will visit the various classes of the high school during the first period, and will give three-minute talks at the opening of the class.

A delegation of three of the speakers will attend the chamber of commerce luncheon during the noon hour, and repeat their talks.

### Central Oregon Railroad Report Approval Sought

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Feb. 11.—Approval of the Oregon public service commission's action in seeking the interstate commerce commission order for the construction of 321 miles of railroad through central and southern Oregon would be given by the legislature under a joint resolution introduced by Representative Carlin of Jackson county yesterday afternoon.

The resolution points out that construction of the railroad in question "would open up that vast stretch of undeveloped country and afford better access to the markets of the prairie states, the Mississippi and Missouri river valleys and the eastern United States to the products of both eastern and western Oregon."

### Governor Pierce Signs 16 Bills

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Feb. 11.—Governor Walter M. Pierce today signed 16 bills. Among them were:

S. B. 170, Umatilla county delegation—Increasing salaries of certain Umatilla county officers and submitting question to the people.

S. B. 101, committee on military affairs—Exempting from taxation property of honorably discharged veterans of Mexican, Civil and Indian wars.

S. B. 91, committee on education—Changing the name "truant officer" to "attendance supervisor" and making that official a part of the school administration.
