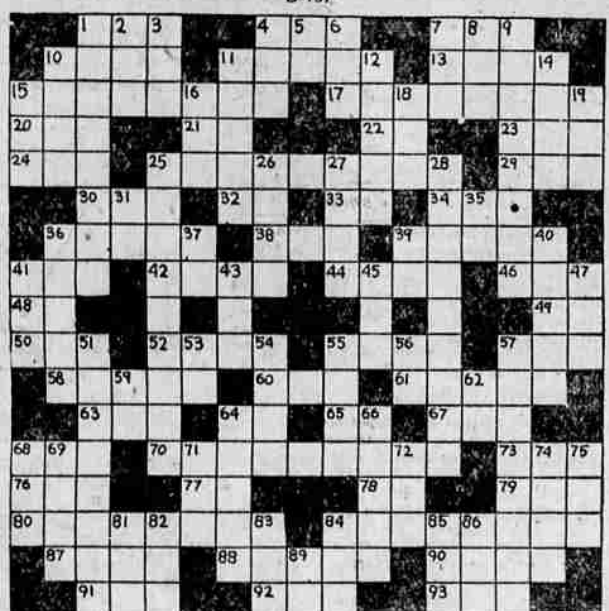
## Radio Programs

Mrs. McPherson has made many unusual uses of her station, one of which was the radio-assembly of services to congregations assembled in tents in nearby towns.

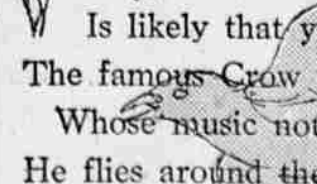

Home Hints

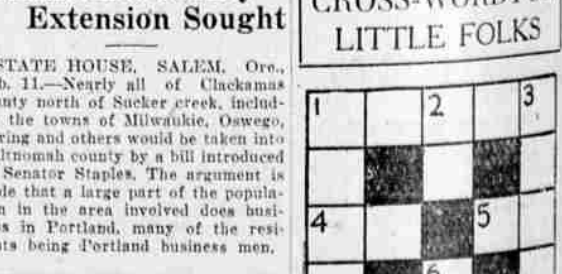
To open a coconut, bore a hole in the eye and empty the milk. Then place the nut in the oven and the heat will crack the shell so the meat can be removed easily.



Poached Eggs  
Poached eggs are much more quickly digested than fried eggs because they are cooked at a lower temperature.



For Vegetables  
Before using vegetables that form heads, such as lettuce, cabbage or cauliflower, wash thoroughly and cover with cold water, adding a little vinegar. Let stand half an hour or so and any insects hidden within will crawl out.



For Mayonnaise  
The white of an egg, stiffly beaten, added to the mayonnaise salad dressing, makes it much more delicious.
