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EUGENE HIGH TO SEND DELEGATES TO O. A. C. SHOW

Eugene high school has been invited to send delegates to the second annual Educational exposition this year at Oregon Agricultural college. It will be held during the Washington birthday holidays, February 21 to 23. Because of the enrollment of Eugene high school, it would be entitled to approximately 25 delegates, but only half a dozen will probably be sent, according to David M. Jones, principal.

Official representatives of the school will be chosen by the high school council, and will be accompanied by Corralis by Mr. Jones, and two faculty members. More than 600 high school student delegates and faculty members attended the exposition last year, and indications are that more will attend this year. In addition to the official delegates a large number of students expect to attend for the educational features. The representation from Eugene will approximate 25 or 30, says Mr. Jones.

Educational and vocational guidance is one of the chief aims of the annual exposition. Not only will every school and department of the college prepare an elaborate display of the work carried on by it, but national figures in the educational world will be here for the period to confer with students regarding their choice of a career and whether the students' bent in life can be developed at O. A. C. or not.

Dr. Stanley Coulter, dean of men at Purdue university, will counsel with the men, and an equally prominent woman will meet the girls.

While the exposition is primarily educational, recreation for the visitors will not be neglected. Friday evening a night horse show is scheduled while Saturday evening an all-school stunt show will be staged. One or more basketball games have been tentatively arranged, and Sunday afternoon concerts by campus musical organizations will be featured.
