

COMMITTEE ASKS CLEAVER REMOVAL

(Continued from page one) The findings of the committee follow: 1-Your committee appointed under Senate concurrent resolution number one to make an investigation of the office of state prohibition commissioner and the enforcement of the prohibition laws, and matters connected therewith, beg to report the following findings: 1-The operation of the law creating the office of prohibition commissioner has not been fully efficient or satisfactory. 2-The commissioner, acting under the advice and direction of the governor assumed the attitude that it was the duty of the district attorneys and sheriffs within the state to cooperate with them. Under this erroneous policy had feeling resulted. In some counties there has been cooperation, but this condition has been an exception and not the rule. In many of the counties there has been actual and continual friction. 3-The records of the commissioner's office disclose a haphazard and unbusinesslike way of conducting the management of the state. Receipts and disbursements of special funds coming in the hands of the commissioner are not disclosed by his report. This special fund was kept by the commissioner under the advice and direction of the governor. The committee makes no charge of dishonesty upon the part of the commissioner. 4-There is conclusive evidence, both written and verbal that the commissioner used his official position in some instances to further the political fortunes of candidates for office and to defeat other candidates. The political activity of the commissioner has not been passive, but on the contrary has been active. 5-Pursuant to orders of the governor, which were later reduced to writing, \$1500 of the state prohibition fund was turned over by the commissioner to the superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League. This money was turned over as aforesaid in June and the early part of July, 1924. No itemized statement covering the expenditure of this money was ever made by the superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League to the commissioner. The amount of this fund was spent in high living, debauchery and immorality upon the part of so-called investigating agents. No prosecutions have resulted from the activities of these agents. It is claimed by the governor, the prohibition commissioner and the superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League that \$1500 was expended in order to secure evidence for the purpose of convicting "large rum runners." The governor has asserted that the money was well spent, and it is claimed that prosecutions will result. However, up to the present time no large "rum runner" has been arrested or convicted as a result of said investigation. Considerable time has elapsed since the investigations were made, and Weinberg, the chief investigator, has departed from the state of Oregon in answer to an indictment in the state of New York. 6-A general statement has been submitted to the committee by the superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League covering the expenditure of the said sum of \$1500. This statement shows that large sums were expended for hotels and meals for Mr. and Mrs. Weinberg and guests consisting of "large rum runners"; and that a party at the said sum was expended for taxi, auto hire, cigars, drinks, etc. Money was spent freely by these agents in houses of prostitution for the purpose of purchasing drinks and for other purposes which were improper. The committee believes Weinberg and his assistant, Hugo, should never have been employed at the expense of the state prohibition fund. The methods employed by these so-called investigators were not law enforcement but lawlessness. Their activities are a stain upon the prohibition cause. 7-The commissioner had no previous experience which qualified him for the office and is not temperamentally suited to the work which is devolved upon him. He has been unfortunely in the selection and approval of the number of agents employed by him. Some of these agents have been convicted of crimes before their employment and others were guilty of malfeasance during the term of their

employment by the commissioner. In two instances, a chief deputy of the commissioner has assaulted persons placed under arrest by him for the purpose of enforcing confessions from them. The commissioner, however has immediately discharged such employees as soon as their conduct became known to him. It has been difficult for him to secure the services of competent and trustworthy men, and the governor has appointed too many special agents without any knowledge of their character or qualifications as law enforcement officers. 7-The department has been conducted upon the theory, at least in part, that it was better to capture a corrupt official than a bootlegger and has been unduly concerned about the conduct of public officials. 8-The report of the commissioner with respect to the results obtained by his office is exaggerated and inaccurate. The best results in the enforcement of the prohibition law have been obtained under the direction of duly elected sheriffs and district attorneys of the various counties. Although special agents were paid by the district attorneys of the various counties they were required to report to the commissioner and the results of their work are credited to the commissioner—as though they were working under his immediate direction. In addition thereto, large credit is taken for work of which neither Mr. Cleaver nor his assistant had the slightest part. In some counties the commissioner is entitled to credit. 9-The commissioner has done practically nothing towards the enforcement of the narcotic law. The narcotic evil is one of the most serious matters confronting the people of this state and the work of the commissioner in the enforcement of narcotic laws has been almost all. 10-By reason of the inexperience of the commissioner, he was directed by the governor to keep in close touch with the superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League and to follow his advice, which the commissioner has consistently done. 11-Under the act creating the office of prohibition commissioner the power of appointing the commissioner

would virtually supplant the present act. With Hare in this recommendation are Representatives Rushlight, Fitzmaurice, Lowman and Swan. The other recommendation, signed by Representative Hurlburt and Senators Eddy, Johnson, Butler and Garland urges that there be a change in the office of prohibition commissioner without delay. They would strengthen the present act by giving the prohibition department twice the amount of money it now receives, under the act. The recommendations signed by Hare and the four representatives follows in full: "A better machinery should be provided for the enforcement of the prohibition laws than the act providing for the appointment of a prohibition commissioner and agents to be selected by the governor. "The fines and forfeitures obtained by the various counties in the enforcement of the prohibition laws should be expended for the purpose of enforcing the various prohibition acts. The major portion of the money thus obtained should be expended under the direction and control of the district attorneys and sheriffs of the various counties. Their work should be supplemented by a "flying squadron" of carefully selected and competent law enforcing officers to be selected by the attorney-general and required to co-operate with the various law enforcing officers of the state. These officers will be able to perform valuable service in working with the sheriffs. "In regard for law is a more serious menace than the evils resulting from the liquor traffic. The duty of enforcing the laws should be placed squarely upon the shoulders of sheriffs and district attorneys and they should be assisted by the state officers to be selected as hereinbefore stated." The recommendations signed by Representative Hurlburt and the four senators follow: "We recommend the continuance of the present law creating the office of prohibition commissioner but that there should be a change in the commissioner without delay. "We recommend that the funds available for the enforcement of the
