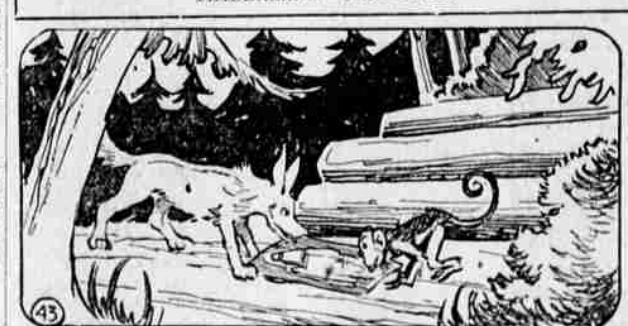
Edna Dillon and Leda Sales have returned after an absence.

Schools and Church

Fail to Keep Men Out of Jail Cells

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Surveys among prisoners in the Los Angeles county jail indicate that there is something wrong with present educational and religious methods. In the opinion of Raymond L. Turner, director of the Los Angeles Crime Commission, he expressed this view at a recent meeting of the Southern California Academy of Criminology.

Seven per cent of the inmates of the county jail, Mr. Turner said, were college graduates, as against 6 1/2 per cent in ordinary civil life; 12 1/2 per cent of the prisoners had college training; 45 per cent were high school graduates, compared with 25 per cent outside the walls.

All the prisoners agreed, added Mr. Turner, that there had been a lack of moral training and a deficit of character-building training in the schools, and that the same thing was true of the religious, a majority of which were represented.

Mr. Turner declared that most of the prisoners concurred in the belief that habitual criminals should not be allowed to bring children into the world. All believed in punishment, he continued, but favored institutions where prisoners could be employed in producing some commodity.

NOTHING ELUDES OPERATOR'S EAR

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Daily conferences held after business hours in Los Angeles amount up to the thousands, according to N. R. Powley and G. De Nevers, Southern California Telephone officials, who say that around 5 o'clock every evening several thousand business men call up to inform their wives that they can't get home to dinner, usually because of a "conference."

"During the brief period between 4:45 and 5:10 p. m., the telephone girls handle more calls a minute than at any other time during the day," said Mr. Powley. "The bulk of them are men calling up their wives about not being able to get home to dinner." Various other factors that make the traffic in telephone calls jump and cause switchboards to light up like the proverbial Christmas tree, said Mr. De Nevers, are fires, explosions and radio announcers requesting listeners-in to "call up and let us know how you hear us." If a day opens with clear weather and rain comes up later, the number of phone calls increases unbelievably, the officials said. Everybody seems to be calling up to cancel engagements or to rent taxis.

Checking over the 1,750,000 calls a day, the telephone operators say that the popular notion is correct: men can not compete with women in long conversations.

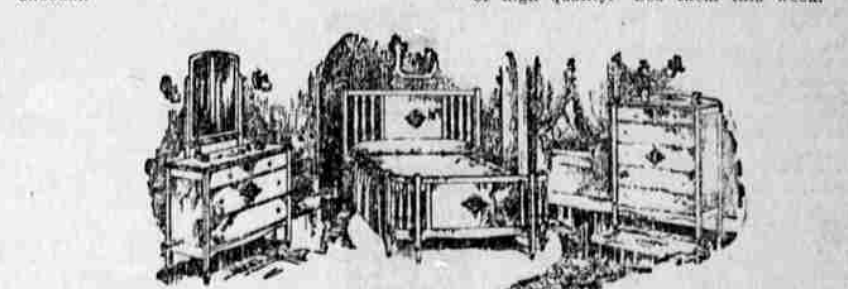
