

# Y. M. C. A. DRIVE CAMPAIGN FUND GROWS RAPIDLY

## "Y" CAMPAIGN RESULTS

Total Quota ..... \$12,500.00  
 Total Subscribed..... \$ 3,960.10  
 To Be Raised ..... \$ 8,539.90

A total of 31 per cent of the \$12,500 goal in the Y. M. C. A. budget week campaign had been reached by noon according to reports of team captains given at lunch today. A total of 337 subscriptions showed a total of \$3,960.10 pledged.

Division "A" led by J. O. Holt with 81 per cent of their quota subscribed leads division "A." The team composed of Mrs. Mamie Bisconer, captain, Mrs. Charles Shunway, Mrs. O. B. Morgan, Mrs. H. F. Leaders, Miss Mary Stollig and Mrs. F. Loucks, retained the lead among individual teams gained yesterday, with 74 per cent of the total accounted for.

The team captained by H. A. Souly leads all others in subscription totals.

Frank Eberhart, Eugene secretary, announced that 40 per cent of the subscriptions reported the first day were from persons making donations for the first time.

The campaign will continue throughout the present week, with a final wind-up meeting on Monday. Lunches will be held this week on tomorrow and Friday.

# INTERNAL REVENUE AGENT IS VISITOR

James L. Furnish of Portland, member of the internal revenue department, arrived in Eugene today, and has taken offices on the second floor of the city hall, where he will be glad to assist taxpayers and wage-earners of Eugene in making up their income tax reports. Mr. Furnish will remain in the office until March 15.

Many people are likely to pay too much income tax unless they take advantage of the reductions made by new changes in the federal measure, according to Mr. Furnish. Thousands of dollars of excess payments on income taxes have been paid since January 1, according to the internal revenue bureau, because of failure to take advantage of the reductions.

Most taxpayers notice that the normal rates for small incomes are much lower than last year, and pay accordingly.

But they don't notice this: "Earned income" only has to pay 75 per cent of the tax as computed under the regular rate.

Earned income, according to the new law, includes "wages, salaries, professional fees and other amounts received as compensation for services actually rendered."

All net income for 1924 up to the sum of \$5,000, is regarded as "earned net income," for the purpose of making this 25 per cent reduction.

The total of "earned net income," however, can be as high as \$10,000 but no higher.

For example, a taxpayer who received \$2,000 in salary and \$3,000 in profit from a real estate deal is entitled to count it as "earned income" and pay three-fourths of the tax on it. A taxpayer who gets a salary of \$10,000 is entitled likewise to deduct 25 per cent. A taxpayer with a salary of \$5,000, and a real estate deal profit of \$5,000, however, is entitled to the deduction only on the \$5,000 of salary. A taxpayer whose net salary income for 1925 was \$15,000 can deduct the credit of the tax on only \$10,000.

The personal exemptions and deductions for dependents are taken out of the income before arriving at the "net income" on which the tax, and, in many cases, the 25 per cent reduction, is decided.

The history of the church is being compiled, as is a list of its pioneer members, its various pastors, and all happenings of the community in which the church has taken part. # Bankers Take Over Bulk of Armour's Holdings in Deal Involving \$8,000,000 sum

CHICAGO, Feb. 18. — In a deal representing approximately \$8,000,000, bankers who are taking over the bulk of the personal holdings of J. Ogden Armour in the financial re-organization of Armour and company, packers, have agreed to purchase the Morris' family stock holdings in Armour and company.

Two years ago when Morris and company was sold to Armour and company, the Morris family took in part payment approximately 450,000 shares of class A common stock of Armour and company. This stock came from Mr. Armour's holdings and left him with about 975,000 shares.

The banking group took a five year option on Mr. Armour's class A stock and also about 1,400,000 shares of class B stock. They announced last week that part of the option had been exercised and that approximately 700,000 shares of each issue would be offered for public subscription today at \$23 for class A and \$14 for class B.

It was understood Mr. Armour eventually would receive around \$52,000,000 from his common stock in both classes under the terms of the bankers' proposition. This will enable the liquidation of remaining bank loans and still leave him a fortune estimated between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000, it was said.

# CANTON PROMOTES HERBERT E. WALKER

Herbert E. Walker, 1005 High street, retired major of Canton Hovey, No. 4, uniformed rank of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, has been elevated to the position of chief of state of the Oregon department, with a rank of lieutenant-colonel, according to an announcement by Brigadier General W. E. Wadsworth of Portland, head of the Canton Hovey in Oregon. This promotion puts Mr. Walker in the second highest office of the order in the state.

Members of Canton Hovey No. 4 will go to Junction City Thursday night to assist in the annual installation of officers and to put on initiatory work. Automobiles will leave the lodge hall at about 7:15 o'clock. Members will be in full uniform, and Lieutenant-Colonel Herbert E. Walker will be the installing officer.

# Underscored Letters Are Introduced in Trial of Mr. Stokes

CHICAGO, Feb. 18. — (Special).—Letters underscored in green and red and purported to be written in 1920 by W. E. D. Stokes, New York millionaire, to a confidential agent making investigations concerning "our Helen" were read into evidence today in the trial of Mr. Stokes, charged with conspiracy to defame his estranged wife, Helen Elwood Stokes of Denver.

The letters identified by Benjamin Harrison, negro, the investigator, characterized as "nonsense" Harrison's reports at certain persons mentioned by Stokes never existed, and reproached him for failing to give satisfaction in developing evidence against "our Helen."

Defense counsel challenged the admission of the letters because of the vari-colored underscorings. The witness said, however, that they were thus underscored when received.

# FARM OPERATIONS OF INSTITUTIONS ARE CONSIDERED

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Feb. 18.—That all farming operations at state institutions should be placed under the supervision of one man, to the end of saving the state an estimated \$100,000 a year has been recommended to the ways and means committee last night by a sub-committee of which Senator Beals was chairman, and this recommendation will be submitted to the state board of control.

Losses in the farm operation at some of the institutions, ascertained in an investigation by Beals and others, caused the recommendation.

In making allowances for institutions the committee made provision for a new industrial building at the state insane hospital, the purchase of additional land at the eastern Oregon insane hospital and cattle to stock and a new building at the tuberculosis hospital.

The normal school policy was discussed at length last night on a motion by Senator Dun that the committee report favorably on his bill to re-establish an Ashland normal school. The committee could not agree and further consideration of the bill was deferred until tonight.

Allowances by the committee last night were:

Deaf school \$113,000, girls' school \$63,840, training school \$101,675, state hospital \$900,408, eastern Oregon hospital \$617,800, institution for feeble minded \$482,700, tuberculosis hospital \$215,000, Oregon national guard (reconsidered) \$185,000.

# REVENUE BILLS TO BE TAKEN UP

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Feb. 18.—In a nutshell the revenue producing bills now before the ways and means committee and the amount that each is estimated to produce are:

Revision from Vale relief fund \$29,000.

Suspension of industrial accident commission aid \$50,000.

Additional tax on insurance companies \$294,000.

Cigarette tax \$600,000.

Quarter mill road tax repeal \$265,000.

Additional corporation tax \$229,200.

Cosmetic tax \$100,000.

Ten per cent of fees from various station activities \$200,000.

Battleship Oregon refund \$30,000. Today \$1,758,200.

In addition to this Governor Pierce has proposed a peddlers' license bill there is the possibility of a motion picture tax.

Besides the above sums the state has in cash for the committee's consideration \$5,084,981.

Available funds if the above measures pass, are expected to exceed appropriations by several hundred thousand dollars.
