Father O'Hara To Speak—Rev. E. V. O'Hara, pastor of the Eugene Catholic church, will speak at alumni hall on the university campus tonight on "Catholic Christianity." Father O'Hara's talk will treat of the history, constitution and practice of the Catholic church. The spiritual life of the Catholic, the mass, the place of the papacy in the church and the place of Catholic Christianity in world religion are some of the topics he will review.

X-Ray Is Added—The latest type of dental X-ray machine has been added by Dr. Wright B. Lee to the equipment in his office. The new machine is a wall model, and is built by the General Electric company. The photographing can be brought directly over the dental chair, making it possible to

take the X-Ray without the patients leaving the chair. Dr. Lee has been operating the machine on approval, and has notified the manufacturers that he will keep it.
