

# "Y" CAMPAIGN IS NEARING GOAL AS CAPTAINS REPORT

**"Y" CAMPAIGN RESULTS**

The sum of \$3,800 remains unsubscribed in the "Y. M. C. A. budget week campaign, according to reports of team captains turned in this noon at luncheon. It was announced that the campaign would continue through Monday in an effort to secure the desired amount.

Individual subscriptions are averaging approximately \$15 and are well distributed over the city, it is indicated by the tabulated results. Reports from each day are carefully checked that the campaign leaders may know best where to concentrate their forces.

No noon meeting of the workers will be held tomorrow. All are expected to be present at the association building at nine o'clock on Monday morning. Over the week-end the campaign will be completely revamped, and new prospects and districts allotted to the workers.

Keen competition between teams was indicated by today's reports. Following are the percentages of quotas raised as reported by the highest captives: Mrs. Mammie Biscione, 110 per cent; Dr. S. W. Moody, 88 per cent; Raymond Torrey, 83 per cent; Dr. G. P. Winchell, 75 per cent; H. A. Solis, 71 per cent; E. O. Immel, 70 per cent.

Division "A" under A. E. Brigham with \$4,620 subscriptions is leaving division "B" which has reported \$3,381.

# DOG TRIAL JUDGES WILL BE SELECTED

Judges for the spring field trials of the Oregon Field Trial association, to be held at Lebanon April 3 to 5, are being voted upon, announces W. J. Wallace, president of the association. Mr. Wallace received a letter today from C. S. Whitmore, secretary of the association, saying that only one outside judge would be chosen, the others being Oregon dog enthusiasts and experienced field trial men.

Dues of the Oregon Field Trial association are still \$3, although through a popular misbelief the figure was believed to be \$5, says Mr. Wallace. The matter of raising the dues to the organization came up at the last meeting, according to Mr. Wallace, but was not voted favorably. The trials will be conducted in Eugene next fall without asking for local sportsmen for donations to pay expenses, it is believed, if enough memberships to the association can be sold.

Oregon and Washington field dogs walked off with most of the prize money at the Bakersfield trials, it is announced.

# CORRECT BONUS ON RECEIPT, ADVISES RED CROSS OFFICE

A number of Eugene's ex-service men who applied for the adjusted compensation and who have received their policies have found them to be short from \$50 to \$200 or more, announces Miss Grace Norton, secretary of the Red Cross. Men who have neither had acknowledgment of the application nor received the policy themselves should notify branch officers of the Adjusted Compensation bureau in Washington, D. C.

"Six weeks should be ample time to allow either for receipt of application or policy," says Miss Norton. "Each man should figure his adjusted service credit and multiply by the factor nearest his age. Now is the time to correct such errors, and the table of factors is as follows:
