LONDON, Feb. 23.—(AP)—Although it is known through the medical bulletins issued from Buckingham Palace that King George's condition is not serious as a result of his attack of bronchitis, the fact that his physicians have ordered him to the Mediterranean for the remainder of the winter has caused quite a stir, of which the newspapers take full advantage for front-page displays.

### TWO SENATORS TO FACE CHARGES OF IMPROPER ACTIONS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—With one United States senator already under indictment on charges of accepting a fee for practicing before a government agency, the justice department is investigating charges that two others have improperly used their influence in Washington.

### Jennings Lodge Man Not Badly Injured

B. Parks who went to Corvallis Saturday to investigate the accident.

### School Directors To Talk Election

Discussion of the election of a new school superintendent for Eugene will probably come before the meeting of the school board tomorrow evening, although whether there will be an election at this time will not be determined until the meeting convenes, according to members of the board.

### GOVERNMENT LOAN CONTROL IS ASKED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—Control by the federal government of all American banking and investment credit in the international field, as a means of promoting world peace was advocated today in the senate by Senator Shipstead of Minnesota, the farmer-labor member of the foreign relations committee.

### CONTEST ATTEMPT FAILS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—An unsuccessful effort was made in the senate to open one phase of the election contest which Daniel F. Steck, democrat, has instituted against Senator Brookhart, republican, Iowa.

### Organization of States Planned by Progressive Group

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—Delegates to the convention of the conference for progressive political action who Saturday decided to form a new national party, after sine die adjournment of their convention, yesterday concluded their meeting here by adopting plans for organization of states and allotting representation in a national convention to be called later.

### Four Killed When Train Strikes Car

KENOSHA, Wis., Feb. 23.—Only two out of a party of six escaped death here today when their automobile was struck by a northbound North Shore Electric Limited train three miles north of Kenosha.

### Data for Garbage Incinerator Sent

Data on the operation of the municipal incinerator owned by the city of Palo Alto, Calif., have been received by Mayor E. B. Parks who has been obtaining information on the methods employed by other cities in the problem of rubbish and garbage disposal.

### THIRTY KILLED IN FIRE; 38 INJURED

CAIRO, Feb. 23.—Thirty persons were killed and 38 seriously injured in a fire which destroyed nearly the whole of the village of Rahmantya near Mambur today. Five hundred huts were burned.

### HOUSE AIRCRAFT COMMITTEE ASSEMBLES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The house aircraft committee, which abruptly terminated its inquiry into the aircraft controversy last Saturday assembled behind closed doors today and discussed various features of the tangle into which its affairs have fallen.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Michael Sullivan, Bronx politician, baseball manager and owner of race horses, died at Mount Sinai hospital today, half an hour after he had been shot, under circumstances and by persons so far unknown at Taylor's Inn, a Bronx cabaret.

### Denials Issued

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Rotarians Plan Trip—Eugene Rotary will have a 100 per cent representation, at least part of the time, at the twelfth annual district convention at Portland March 22 to 24, according to officers of the Eugene club. Hotel accommodations and headquarters have been arranged for the Eugeneans for the session which is expected to be attended by 2000 delegates and visitors. The district comprising Oregon, Washington and British Columbia is one of the largest districts of the international organization and has a membership of nearly 3500 in the 43 clubs organized. One of the attractive social features of the meetings will be the entertainment provided for the wives of the visiting Rotarians, according to word from the executive committee of the Portland club in charge of the program.

Camp Is Marriage Agency—My logging camp is getting to be a regular matrimonial agency," said William Blackburn, superintendent of the Corvallis Logging company, operating a camp near Monroe, who was in Eugene today visiting Frank L. Mr. Blackburn was in Eugene to employ a new cook for the camp, but the only one available was a married woman, so the Blackburn Matrimonial agency will cease to flourish for a while.

Boys Are Exonerated—The group of small boys apprehended Friday night by night police for alleged annoyances at the armory, proved their innocence to W. G. Judkins, chief of police, and were released. "These boys happened to be at the place where a door was broken down at the time the night patrolman arrived," explained Mr. Judkins, "so the officers naturally supposed the boys were responsible. But the young men told me they heard the noise of breaking glass and merely went around to see what had happened. I am convinced from their stories that they were not to blame." The boys were William Noel, Corwin McKimney, Kenneth Colton, La Grande Houghton, Miles McKay, Jack Herrington, John Hall and Burton Smith.

Transportation Is Surveyed—In order to complete a survey of Oregon transportation systems, Dr. Peter O. Crockett, of the department of economics of the University of Oregon, leaves Wednesday for a trip making stops at Reedsport, Gardiner, Lakeview, Coos Bay and Smith River. This survey which has been in preparation for some time is a comprehensive report on the co-ordination of highway, motor and water transportation and will be published by the university in the Commonwealth Review during the coming summer, in the announcement, Dr. Crockett is making a trip in the interests of the extension of the university.

Grotto Leader Coming—Plans are being completed for the meeting to be tendered Charles E. McLean, of Portland, grand standard of the Mystic Order of the Enchanted Grotesque of Eugene next Wednesday evening. "This is the official visit of the national officer to the local grotesque and a program of entertainment and refreshments is being prepared.
