Mrs. Sarah A. Barringer, 64, wife of J. W. Barringer, died suddenly at her home at 1278 Chambers street yesterday. She has been a resident of Eugene for a great many years, coming to Oregon in 1903 from Kan-

Besides her husband, Mrs. Barringer is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Jessie C. Jones and Mrs. F. Snodgrass of Eugene; a son, S. F. Barringer of Tacoma; two sisters, Mrs. R. D. Westhafer, Dunavant, Kan., and Mrs. Katharine Miller, Sabetha, Kan.; and a brother, S. D. Mears of Los Angeles, Cal.

Born in Wyandott county, Ohio, December 19, 1859, Mrs. Barringer moved with her parents to Kiwatha, Kan., at the age of nine. Here she was married to J. W. Barringer December 26, 1880. They moved to Oregon in March, 1903. She was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church of Eugene; the Pythian Sisters; Degree of Honor; and Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The body is at the Veatch chapel, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

### PLANS FOR STREET WIDENING OPPOSED

That the proposal to widen Willamette street for vehicular traffic by cutting off two feet of the sidewalks on both sides has drawn considerable opposition was admitted by Mayor Parks today who states that he has been informed that there will be a number of property owners present at the council meeting tomorrow evening.

Several owners of large property interests on Willamette street prominent among them being Frank L. Chambers have expressed a strong stand against the proposal to narrow the sidewalks. Several local merchants have voiced the opinion that wider sidewalks than at present may be necessary to meet the increasing needs of the business district rather than cutting away from the space now used. It is pointed out that even under present conditions the Saturday night crowds of shoppers tax the sidewalk space when going from store to store and that simply transferring the congestion from the street to the sidewalks is not a solution of the problem of increased motor traffic.

Carl G. Washburn, member of the city council and also owner of Willamette street property, stated that he has been sounding the sentiment of local business men on the proposition and that he will probably oppose the plan for Willamette street.

Items eliminated included budget requested of \$125,000 for use in inspections by the department of commerce in connection with interferences in radio receiving sets.

The postoffice department, the committee's report said, plans to make contract for air mail service between Los Angeles and Salt Lake City, Chicago and St. Louis, Boston and New Hampshire and perhaps about Elko, Nev., to a point near Portland, Ore.

Included in the bill are \$150,000 to be used toward erection of a memorial to the women of the world in the form of a building site of the American Red Cross building here; \$374,305 for the Omaha Indians of Nebraska for interest awarded by the court of claims; \$42,000 for an international conference on oil pollution of navigable waters to be held here; \$75,000 for the international radio telegraphic conference; \$6,000 for debt commission expenses; and \$20,000 for distribution for German war trophies.

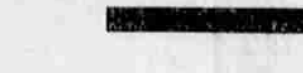

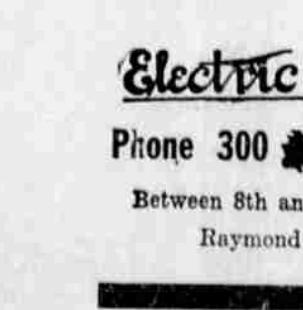

### EUGENE MEN BLOCK GAME FUND CHANGE

Sportsmen of Eugene, members of the Oregon Sportsmen's club, Field Trials club and Lions club are busy today protesting the proposal submitted to the state legislature whereby 15 per cent of the state game protection funds be diverted to the general fund. News of the proposed action was received yesterday afternoon by telegram from Earl C. Simmons, president of the Oregon Sportsmen's association, to W. R. Wallace.

"This project, if carried out, would seriously curtail game propagation," said Mr. Simmons. "It would also mean the inauguration of serious retrenchments that would seriously handicap sportsmen. Game protection funds are contributed for the protection of game and our representatives should be advised by telegram to vigorously protest the diversion of these funds."

On a basis of receipts this year in the game protection fund, which totaled \$423,140.46, the proposed 15 per cent would take away \$63,472.42, declares Mr. Wallace.

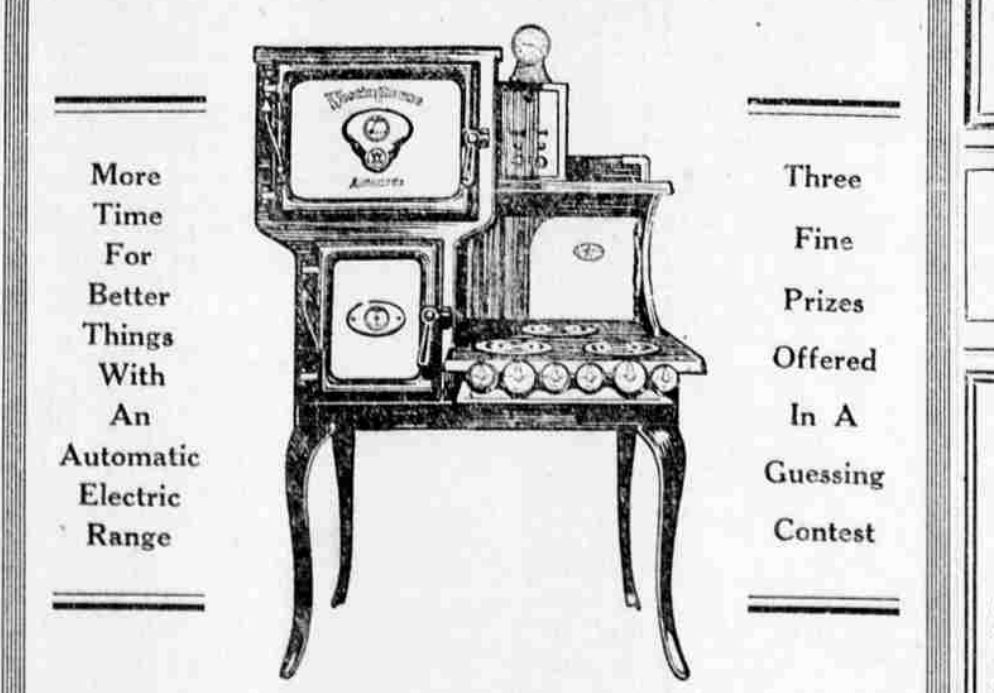
