

CHAUTAUQUA LISTS OF ATTRACTIONS IN EUGENE ARE READY

Programs to be presented in Eugene at the annual chautauqua to be held Tuesday, July 7, to Tuesday, July 14, have been announced by the Eugene-Chautauqua committee.

"The Mikado" is the opera of the season's program and "Daddy Long Legs" is the play announced. May Leake is producer of the opera and the Elias Day players will present the play.

"Four musical numbers range from classical performance of the Charles Mitchell Concert Trio, the novel features of Leake's Orchestral Entertainers, the charming work on cornet, piano and with voice of the Houghman-Pfeiffer Duo, two young western girls who have sprung into popular popularity, the quaint and clever performance of Maupin's Singing band of nine costumed young men who not only sing but play every instrument in the musical category and do some ensemble acting," the announcement states.

"The Eugene-Chautauqua service feels fortunate in securing Captain S. K. Gudmundson, grizzled mariner who bearded the Lousavik council in its own, traveling overland through northern Siberia in midwinter to demand his rights as an American citizen."

"The most weighty subject to be handled will be that of world peace, always of paramount interest to Americans. Colonel (Rev.) George Falls of the Canadian Memorial church, Vancouver, B. C., former chaplain who has made personal investigation of torments and penalties, will handle this subject. In direct contrast to this line of thought will be Oney Fred Sweet's unique lecture on "The Other Fellow's Shoes" which will outline his personal experience in holding 100 different jobs and looking at the world from 100 different viewpoints."

"Alton Packard, comedy-cartoonist and humorist, who gives a perfectly delineated exposition of human nature with pictures, music and song, augmented by a clever 'talk' heads the list of entertainers. Rosella Knapp Breed, noted Boston humorist and character portrayal, is another entertainer who gives an insight into so many varied characters that she holds the rapt attention of all audiences."

"Margaret Byers, one of the most talented child impersonators of the day, will entertain the little ones on Junior Chautauqua day. The selection of a children's program has been given very careful attention. Little Miss Byers will delight and entertain the juniors with just the kind of fun parents will desire for their children. She is able supported and will give a children's program that cannot be surpassed."

CITY COUNCIL TO BE BUSY TONIGHT

A lively session of routine business faces the city council at its session tonight, reports Mayor E. B. Parks. With the bond election resolutions out of the way and most of the spring and summer paving ordinances complete, the session will be devoted largely to passing assessment ordinances, and hearing petitions from taxpayers.

Contract will be let for the south Willamette sewer district, bids on this project having been advertised. Four alley ordinances are on the calendar for passage.

Paving assessment ordinances for Eleventh avenue west and Longview projects will be voted upon.

Vacation of part of High street to connect with the municipal auto park is the title of another ordinance to be considered.

Petitions will be read from taxpayers objecting to the city dog pound, and proposing to have Twelfth avenue from Van Buren to Tyler street opened.

If the city will finance the trip of some of the members of the council to California to inspect the operation of power street sweepers, the council will make the trip, according to Mayor Parks. It is considered likely that this matter will come up tonight.

Lane Contingents Soon Will Return

With the near approach of the close of the state legislative session the Lane county contingent that attended the more than six weeks of debate are returning and Judge Alta King, clerk at the session, is the first one to return home. Judge King although not commenting on the amount of legislation passed did state that the session was "well behaved." The session is expected to end this week and then the Lane county senators and representatives will return as well as Colonel W. G. D. Mercer, sergeant-at-arms of the senate; Sherman Roberts, assistant sergeant-at-arms of the house; and Albert Bede, reading clerk of the senate. Lane county also had a number of unofficial lobbyists present at various times during the session.
