

DEMAREST SERVICE PROVES TO BE ONE OF REAL INTEREST

"She hands it to them," would be the Yankee way of expressing what he thought of the manner in which Mrs. Booth-Clibborn Demarest delivers her sermons at the revival now under way in the armory under the auspices of three local churches.

Let it be understood that this does not refer particularly to sinners, but to the men all right and left. The writer has been privileged to attend two of the services and learned, first hand, that there is such a place as a "hot-tomatoes pit" as well as a place called "heaven."

It may be stated that some men argue that there is no such place as the bottomless pit where erring humanity is destined, for the reason that God has no use for such a place, but when Evangelist Demarest leads you along one of her interesting stories to illustrate her point and reaches said point there seems to be no tenable ground upon which to stand to controvert the point she makes—when her finger is pointing (it would seem) directly at you.

The writer has listened to many a sermon, both good and bad, and his memory fails to recall any preacher, whether man or woman, who can drive a truth home in such power and logic.

Her sermons are well suited to most any denomination and there is no valid reason—why any person, male or female, Christian or non-Christian, who cannot derive a great deal of benefit from the messages she delivers and I would offer the suggestion that all Eugene should visit the services and hear one of the most powerful preachers that have ever visited the city.

Mr. Demarest, the song leader, is a man well above the height of the average man. One would naturally expect a certain amount of brusqueness from so large a man, but instead of exhibiting his strength in some outward demonstration, one finds him gentle of voice and of pleasing personality.

In sharp contrast to her husband, Mrs. Demarest is frail of figure and while her figure may indicate a lack of physical strength, her power lies in another direction and I believe she is a power for good to this city. The city would do well to get in touch with these services, not so much because they are primarily religious, but because of the homely, yet forceful truths that are expressed by this woman evangelist.

Dr. Sanford, occupying a superintendency in the Methodist church denomination was present and offered the opening prayer.

The choir sings beautifully under the super-conductors of the song leader. He is not only a good conductor, but a master at the piano.

The evangelist took her text from the last chapter of second Corinthians: "Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith; prove your own selves. Know ye not your own selves, how that Jesus Christ is in you, except ye be reprobrates?"

She made the point that Christians should know, without doubt, whether Christ dwelt within, and if he did they certainly would know it.

It was announced last evening that each morning at 10 o'clock, a special service will be held at the First Baptist church under the direction of Mr. Demarest. These services, it was learned, will be for those who wish to pray and testify, and will last but one hour. It was given out that business men are especially invited to run away from their work for this hour and attend the service.

There will be services in the armory each night this week at 7:30—with a rousing song service.

AIR SUPERVISOR IS INVITED TO EUGENE

To make an inspection of radio interference in Eugene, O. R. Redfern, of Seattle, United States supervisor of radio for this district, will come to Eugene within the next week at the invitation of the Eugene Radio club, it was decided last night at the organization meeting of the club in the chamber of commerce. Approximately 100 radio fans were present.

B. B. Brundage, presiding as temporary chairman, received a telegram from Mr. Redfern in response to an inquiry with regard to amateur wireless telegraph operators "hogging" the air, and ruining programs for local broadcast receivers. The telegram, read at the meeting was:

"If amateurs while using short waves interfere with broadcast reception they must observe quiet hours."

A. S. Myers was elected president of the organization; Wallace N. Winter, vice-president; and Robert Callahan, secretary-treasurer.

Forty-seven of those present last night signed up as charter members of the club, and paid their dues.

Milton Koupal, speaking for amateur readers, said that they had as much right as the broadcast receivers to operate, and that he had picked up code interference from ships while receiving broadcast programs on a neodyne set. Dr. Cedric Wallace explained the method of testing for interference from an X-ray machine. Other amateurs and receivers told of their experiences, and pledged greater cooperation in the future.

Dr. Wallace was made chairman of a committee to frame a constitution and bylaws for the club. Other members were W. R. Wallace and Homer Roberts.

The next meeting of the organization will be held when the air chief makes his visit to Eugene.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 25.—After several days of sunshine, winter descended upon Klamath Falls at 10 o'clock this morning when a light snow began falling. Indications were that it would be a heavy snowfall.

Investigations of Service Body Open

That a government investigation of the "National Disabled Soldiers' League" has been started, is the word received by officials of Eugene post of the American Legion. This organization, claiming to be aiding disabled veterans has sent numerous requests to Eugeneans for funds sending a packet of pencils that are to be purchased by the recipient. The Eugene legion has been strongly opposed to the organization and has warned local people that no official sanction has been given the plan for collection of funds. During the holiday season the deluge of letters from the national organization resulted in many small checks being sent from Eugene to the headquarters at Washington, D. C.

Boy Scout Council Planned in Eugene

Plans for a permanent boy scout organization in Eugene will be discussed Friday night at the chamber of commerce. At a meeting to which two representatives from each service club, civic club and religious organization in the city have been invited.

Arrangements are being made toward the establishment of a first class boy scout council in Eugene, consisting of 12 representative business men of the city, who will supervise the scout work in the city. This council would be formed in the early part of March, it is planned, when H. G. Oberstuffer, regional director of the national boy scouts organization, will visit in Eugene.

Judge Ramsey Will Hear Case in Lane

Judge Ramsey, circuit court judge of the 12th district comprising Yamhill and Polk counties, will be here for the trial of L. R. Edmonson on his appeal of a liquor case from the justice court, according to announcement today. Judge Ramsey is from McMinnville. The Edmonson trial is slated to be heard at the present term of court, Judge G. F. Salpworth withdrew from hearing the case when the defendant filed an affidavit claiming prejudice.

STREET WIDENING PLAN IS OPPOSED

Widening of Eugene streets as proposed at the last council meeting was protested last night by a delegation of business men headed by Robert M. Day. Mr. Day declared that most of the merchants on property affected by the widening were opposed to the move, as sidewalks downtown were too narrow at present.

Others speaking against the move were I. J. Hays, Henry Hollenbeck and Robert Pratt. The Old Fellows lodge also objected to the plan, it was brought out. Mayor E. B. Parks still maintained his original stand that much of the city's traffic troubles could be eliminated by street widening, but declared it was not likely that the council would act under the widespread objection.

Bids on the South Willamette sewer project were opened but the contract was not let. Low bidder was E. K. Lind and George W. Lind of Portland, the figure being \$14,233.40.

After lively discussion on the proposal of the Eugene ministerial association, undertakers and florists for an ordinance prohibiting funerals on Sunday, the council laid the plan on the table.

Protest of residents in the vicinity of Twelfth avenue and Madison street against the present location of the city dog pound was read, and referred to the police committee. Other petitions, one to redesigning a roof of a house inside the fire limits, and another to open Twelfth avenue from Van Buren to Tyler, were referred to committees for recommendation.

A capacity house greeted Albert Spalding, violinist, in his concert last night at the Methodist church. Mr. Spalding used two violins, a Montagni model, on which he played "Tartini's 'Pastorale,'" and a Guarnerius model, used for other numbers.

The most popular selections in Mr. Spalding's repertoire were Paganini's composition, "I Palpiti," rated as one of the most technical violin solos extant; Spalding's own "Berceuse," played with the miter and Schuber's "Ave Maria." His artificial harmonies, by which flute-like tones are produced upon the violin, played in trills and double-stops in "I Palpiti" delighted violin players in the audience, who understood the technique that this selection involved.

Andre Benoit at the piano was a splendid accompanist. The concert was produced under the auspices of the Associated Students, University of Oregon.

Banker Back From Sessions in South

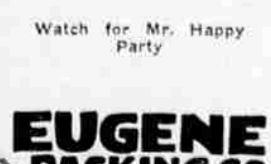
