The hops are to be delivered on the cars at Springfield between October 1, 1925 and December 1, 1925, according to the contract filed for record today at the office of the county clerk.

THOUSAND REPORTED KILLED BY TRIBESMEN

CLOSING HOURS FIND HOUSE IN FRESH BATTLE

Fight is Precipitated When Governor Pierce Gives Warning on Rate

Highway Committee's Work Of Weeks Threatened By New Move

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Feb. 26.—(AP)—Closing hours of the 35rd legislature found the house embroiled in a row over truck and bus line legislation, that threatened to bring to naught the many weeks of work of the roads and highways committees.

The fight was precipitated when Governor Pierce in a message to the house on H. R. 413 warned against setting such high rates against bus and truck lines without giving them a certificate of public necessity and convenience to insure them of some protection against ruthless competition.

CONSPIRATORS ARE CAUGHT IN POISON CASE, SAY POLICE

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 26.—(AP)—Richard M. Hotaling has requested through his counsel that he be permitted to go before the county grand jury on Monday night and answer charges that he conspired to murder his brother's wife, Mrs. Fred Hotaling.

CONSPIRATORS TAKEN

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 26.—(AP)—A second conspirator in the supposed plot to murder Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hotaling, prominent and wealthy San Franciscans through shooting or poison, was arrested here today.

Statement Given Out

The police have made public an alleged statement by King that he hired "Lou" and another gunman known as "AP" for a total of \$2300 at the highest of a San Francisco millionaire to kill the Hotalings. King was trucked to Sacramento and taken into custody.

Mr. Swan Opposed

The move was sharply opposed by Representative Swan, Linu county, but carried. The bill was laid on the table for final disposition this afternoon.
