

LANE ASSESSMENT DEPUTIES TO MEET FOR INSTRUCTIONS

In preparation for the annual assessment of Lane county property a meeting of the deputy assessors has been called for 10 o'clock tomorrow morning by Ben F. Keeney, county assessor. The assessors will start work Monday and all property will be assessed as of March 1, Mr. Keeney states.

Twenty-two deputy assessors have been appointed and each will have a district. The areas of each deputy are based on the county road districts, some having one district and some several. It is expected that some of the deputies will complete their work in about three weeks and others may take at least two months, the assessor said. James Lockebie will have charge of the Eugene district.

MANILA, Feb. 26.—(AP)—The U. S. S. Huron, flagship of the American fleet in Asiatic waters, was returning today to Olongapo after being pulled from a position around in Malampaya Sound, 200 miles southeast of Manila.

The Huron will go on drydock at Olongapo to ascertain the extent to which she was damaged. According to reports received here today, the vessel was steaming slowly when she struck. The point where the Huron went aground is not well charted. Naval officers believe that necessary repairs to the vessel will be made quickly and she will proceed to Java soon.

FASTING IS TOPIC OF EVANGELIST

Shall I say, unique? or shall I say, unfathomable? for a word to fittingly describe this lady evangelist who is delivering such mighty messages at the armory each evening. After sitting under her preaching one naturally tries to compare her with some other woman who has special talent, but it would seem that the power behind this lady evangelist who is an earnest could not have been acquired in so short a time as her years indicate ability so remarkable. It is a gift—not from man, but from him whom she serves.

No doubt some folks attend revivals from different motives, but whatever one's motives may have been they were agreeably entertained last evening by the splendid music that preceded the sermon.

It is to be regretted that the volume that should fill the building is somewhat inhibited by the recess in the wall where the choir is seated. Notwithstanding this handicap the singing is good. The evangelist, who came here to conduct a revival let it be known last evening that she is going to do her part in putting it over.

However, she let it be known, too, that she did not desire a good attendance simply to hear her, but to hear what the Lord had to say.

Mrs. Demarest expressed herself as believing firmly in "first seeking the Lord," as the first step requisite toward a successful revival.

She explained that people hold contrary opinions as to what really constitutes fasting. Some think it means to go without a meal. Others that they should abstain from one thing or another.

"With some," she said, "if they go without a meal it would be remarkable if they did not lose their temper," and she stated that she believed that an occasional fast would vastly benefit the health.

One of the best definitions of fasting the writer has ever heard was illustrated so lucidly that there could be no room for doubt as to the real significance of what fasting meant and what it was intended to bring about.

It wrought a deeper spiritual experience. It separates one from the commonplace and unites one to God. Wordly affairs drop off, and spiritual blessings take their place.

"When we get to the place where we can confess that we are nothing, a place of humility before God, then God can use us," she said.

She concluded by saying that victory will come when we get our eyes on God.

It was announced that special prayer services would precede the preaching service each evening at 7 o'clock in the armory building. This will be in addition to the 10 o'clock service held in the Baptist church.

The lecture by Mrs. Demarest at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at the armory, is to be the first of four and the first should be well attended to get the benefit of them all.

EAGLES' PRESIDENT VISITS IN EUGENE

A class of 49 candidates were initiated into the Fraternal Order of Eagles at the meeting last night, at which Otto Deluse, national president of the lodge, was a guest of honor. Mr. Deluse and his daughter, Norma Deluse, were accompanied to Eugene by O. E. Lee of this city, state president of the Eagles.
