

CITY COUNCIL TO MEET AT 5 TODAY

More than a score of city improvement ordinances, sidewalk ordinances are to be passed, and contract for the South Willamette sewer construction will be let at a special meeting of the city council, called by Mayor E. B. Parks for this afternoon at 5 o'clock in the city recorder's office.

E. K. Lind and George W. Lind, Portland contractors, are conceded to have the advantage in the sewer project, as their bid of \$14,233.40 is more than \$2000 below that of their nearest competitor, Oscar Snow of Eugene, who bid \$16,994 for the job.

Two assessment ordinances for paving Eleventh avenue from Tyler to Chambers street are to be passed, as well as the assessment ordinance for the Longview street sewer.

Other ordinances, together with special ordinances adopting plans and specifications, are to be adopted for the following projects:

Alley between Oak and Pearl streets, from Fifteenth to Sixteenth avenues.

Alley running north and south and east and west through the block bounded by Sixth avenue, Seventh avenue, Oak and Pearl streets.

Graveling and grading alley between Nineteenth and Twentieth avenues from Olive to Charnelton streets.

Alley between Sixth and Seventh avenues, from Oak street west to the alley running north and south through block five of Skinner's donation to Eugene.

Twelve sidewalk improvement ordinances are also up for consideration.

ABBY ROCKEFELLER TO WED MR. MILTON

NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—One of the world's richest girls will step from her parent's mansion into the modest apartment of a young lawyer, when Miss Abby Rockefeller, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and David Meriwether Milton, Jr., are married next May.

The standard of living they will adopt after their marriage will be set by comparatively small salary instead of her parents' millions, it was learned last night with the announcement of their betrothal.

The engagement is the culmination of a romance which started in their childhood and grew during the years their families were neighbors at Pocantico Hills and Seal Harbor, Maine. Last summer Miss Rockefeller was arrested for speeding while she was driving Mr. Milton's car. In this situation he came to her rescue and defended her in court, although he was not then a member of the bar.

He championed her so ably that she got a suspended sentence.

Miss Rockefeller is 21, was born in New York educated at a private school and introduced to society November 22, 1922. Mr. Milton, who is 25, is a graduate of Williams college of the Columbia University law school.

IRRIGATION LEADS TO DEBATE IN LAST DAYS OF CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—History repeated itself in the senate today when as in the final days of the last session western irrigation led to acrimonious debate.

The subject today was the conference report on the interior department bill which has been under successful negotiations for several weeks. Senator Smoot, republican of Utah, manager for the senate, submitted a partial report and asked concurrence but was met with instant objection from Senator Jones, republican of Washington and Walsh, democrat of Montana, because of the reinsertion of what they declared was discriminatory legislation relating to projects in those states.

The items principally complained of related to the Sun river project, Montana and the Kittitas division of the Yakima, Wash., development.

OSLO, Feb. 26.—(AP)—If Queen Maud of Norway had had to earn her own livelihood, she would probably have adopted a literary career. She has a decided inclination towards writing and not only finished one novel but is working steadily on a second. Queen Maud is reported to have told a friend that if her novel was published it would be issued under a pseudonym, and nobody would have any idea as to the real identity of the writer.

CREAMERIES HELD COMMUNITY ASSET

Value of creameries to a community was stressed by Chris Johnson, field representative of the North Pacific Cooperative creameries of Oregon, formerly of the U. S. department of agriculture, in his address at today's meeting of the chamber of commerce.

Using examples from Minnesota, the state with which he is most familiar, Mr. Johnson showed where bank deposits increased in cities as creameries increased. In one county with a population of approximately 28,000 there were 29 creameries, he said, and the bank deposits totaled more than twelve million dollars.

Girls of Lisbon Break Traditions

LISBON, Feb. 26.—(AP)—The women of Portugal slowly are emerging from the almost Moorish seclusion in which they have lived so long, and the first thing they do, under the new freedom, is to go to work. The shops and offices of Lisbon are besieged these days by girls eager to follow in the footsteps of their sisters in other countries, and earn their own living.

Much had to be overcome by these Lisbon girls. There was the resistance and ill-will of the masculine element, grounded in the precedent of many centuries, and a large group of minor state officials, in fear of their own jobs, voiced violent opposition.

In the schools also Portuguese girls have won their victories. They have expelled old traditions, and today are taking their places on the benches along with their brothers.
