

STAGE CHANGED BY EVANGELISTS

"Peculiar People," is the way Mrs. Booth-Cliffborn Demarest, the evangelist now holding revival services each night at the armory characterized Christians. She said that men have been known to walk through a fiery furnace and come out without a hair being singed, because they were "so peculiar" that God walked with them and saw to it that nothing harmed them.

She contrasted the attitude of the world toward a man who is meek and mild, endeavoring to be found humble in the sight of God, with what the Bible has to say about it. She declared that the world has no time for a meek man—classifying him as a weakling and aissy.

Lumber Business Below Production

One hundred and eighteen mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending February 21, manufactured 99,834,457 feet of lumber; sold 90,388,459 feet; and shipped 90,733,080 feet.

New business was nine per cent below production. Shipments were seven per cent above new business.

Thirty-nine per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This was 35,220,020 feet, of which 24,989,945 feet was for domestic cargo delivery; and 10,230,075 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 1037 cars.

Forty-two per cent of the lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 40,551,241 feet, of which 27,008,194 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal; and 12,553,047 feet export. Rail shipments totaled 1071 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 6,052,439 feet.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 128,736,035 feet. Unfilled export orders 109,316,509 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 4983 cars.

In the first eight weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 755,062,883 feet; new business 700,193,856 feet; and shipments 740,610,349 feet.

REALTY BOARD HAS REPORT ON EUGENE

Reports on the real estate market of the United States based on data received from 230 member boards of the organization have been received by members of the Eugene realty board.

The report for this city shows that single-family dwellings are 15 per cent below demand and that apartment buildings are 10 per cent below the needs of the city. There is no shortage of business buildings in the city, the report states, as there will be sufficient available space in desirable locations when present structures are completed this spring.

The movement of rents in Eugene shows an upward trend both for dwellings and business buildings. Dwellings are the chief type of building in demand.

There is plenty of money available for first mortgages in Eugene, according to the report of the realty brokers. The realty market here is going and practically any property can be sold if priced right, the report states.

An old document recently found at Bolgrade says that the first successful glider flight was made at Foca, Belgium, in 1549.

Loggers are busy in Lake creek and Deadwood creek areas cutting piles and big shipments of these are to go out in the spring, according to Sheriff Frank Taylor, who has returned after a business visit of several days in that vicinity. The piles ranging from 30 to 90 feet in length are to be floated to a big boom to form near Swishome. The Lichty and Russell firm are taking out the piles and it is expected that early in the spring the timbers will be floated out, the sheriff states.
