

COLONEL CLOWRY DIES ON PRIVATE CAR IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—The body of Colonel Robert C. Clowry, former president and general manager of the Western Union Telegraph company, died last night in his private car which was returning from Palm Beach, will be taken to Omaha for burial.

Colonel Clowry, who was 86 years of age, had been suffering from a cold for several days and was coming home to Tarrytown, New York, when his condition became serious. A physician was called aboard the train and another was called at Philadelphia. Death came at Elizabeth, N. Y. Death came as the train was entering the Hudson river tunnel that leads into the Pennsylvania station.

Believed in Present.
Colonel Robert C. Clowry, after climbing from messenger boy to the presidency of the Western Union Telegraph company, answered the question: "What are a young man's chances today as compared with when you were a boy?" by saying: "A young man's opportunities are as good now as they ever were. It all depends on the young man. The best of the country has increased more than the right kind of young men have developed. Expansion of business has unlimited opportunities. Industry, perseverance, integrity and intelligence are what is wanted. All great corporations keep in touch with the capacity of their men. Therefore, the young man who has the stuff in him is bound to get ahead."

Born in Illinois.
Born on a farm in Will county, Ill., September 8, 1838, young Clowry gained a common school education and, in 1852, became a messenger for the Illinois and Missouri Telegraph company—later a Western Union subsidiary—at Joliet, Ill. For the first six months, although required to work 12 to 14 hours a day, he received no pay.

After leaving home and ambitious to work as a telegrapher, he did extra work to maintain himself. At the end of the first year, although only 18, Clowry was made manager of the company's offices at Joliet, and, when 21, became superintendent of the company. Colonel Clowry gained his title in a Civil war, which he entered as a captain in 1862.

Colonel Clowry married in 1865, Caroline A. Estabrook, of Omaha, Neb. She died in April, 1869. On November 23, 1910, when he received and was succeeded to the presidency of the Western Union by Theodore N. Vail, he had been in the telegraphic business for 58 years in the telegraphic world. He was one of the promoters of the Chicago world's fair in 1893. He was also a director of the Equitable trust company, New York, a member of the Loyal legion of civil war veterans and of several clubs. For many years, Colonel Clowry's residence had been at Tarrytown, N. Y.

B. Mooney is Declared Guilty

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—The New York Pressmen's union was apprised of the painful necessity of suspending its star member, the Prince of Wales, when a check for \$7, representing two months dues was received from him today.

The rules of the union provide for the suspension of any member who fails to pay his dues every two months. On Saturday this period of grace for the prince would have expired and had he not paid, he would have been barred from paying the trade in any union pressroom here. When Wales was made a member of the union last summer he paid his dues in advance to January 1.
