

# MR. LA FOLLETTE SENT TO BOTTOM OF ASSIGNMENTS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—As a further step in denying republican party status in the senate to Senator LaFollette and his chief supporters, the republican committee on committees has tentatively assigned the Wisconsin senator, together with Senators Brookhart, of Iowa, and Ladd and Frazier of North Dakota to places at the bottom of the list on committees on which they now hold membership.

The action, which was taken yesterday over the written protest of the three senators who supported the LaFollette ticket in the presidential campaign, would give them the same committee status as though elected on an independent instead of the republican ticket. Senator LaFollette himself has made no reply to the committee letter asking in the case of each senator, whether they desired the democratic or republican to make their committee assignments.

The committee's action is subject to approval by the republican party conference, to be held early next month, and later by the senate itself. Although some opposition is expected at both stages, administration leaders believe they can carry out their program.

City work has already increased noticeably, on account of the bridge construction across the millrace. Sewer work also utilized quite an amount of common labor, and although the last contract was completed Thursday the new South Willamette work will begin in the next 10 days. For a short time this work almost used up the employment office's supply of local men.

Agricultural work is getting under way, and a slight increase is noticed in the demand for farm help. A large number of transient workers have left the city for construction work

which is reported to be increasing rapidly in California.

# ASSESSOR OF LANE TELLS OF PRESENT COUNTY VALUATION

With the start of the annual county assessment survey set for Monday, Hen E. Keene, county assessor, today issued a statement on the present assessment figures for Lane and also some explanation about the taxable property for the benefit of tax payers.

"I believe that public attention should be called to the fact that we are drifting too much toward single taxation of this county. We are not listing on the assessment roll intangible personal property amounts consistent with the general understanding of its existence, for instance, as to money, notes and accounts," Mr. Keene said.

"All property in the state of Oregon is taxable, excepting that specifically exempted by law. Many classes of intangible property are taxable that are seldom reported to the assessor. Generally speaking, all debts due or to become due from solvent debtors, whether on account, contract, note, (mortgage not excepted) or otherwise, either within or without this state; all public stocks, all bonds, warrants and notes, or to become due from this state, or any county or other municipal subdivision thereof (excepting such thereof as may be specifically exempt by law) are taxable.

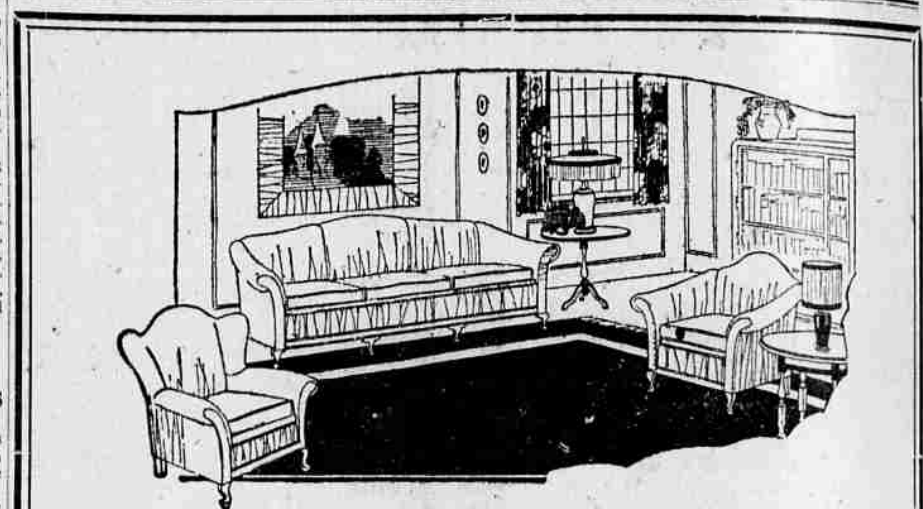
