

THOUSANDS HEAR EVANGELIST TALK

Three thousand people met at the armory yesterday afternoon to hear Victoria Booth Clibborn-Demarest, the evangelist, her subject being "The Lily."

There were lilies in the platform flower decorations and the audience sang the old fashioned hymn, "He's the Lily of the Valley," after which Mrs. Demarest sang a verse of it in French.

The big chorus—developing finely under the direction of Song Leader Demarest, rendered a beautiful piece written by Herbert Clibborn, brother of the evangelist, the title being "How Long My Lord."

It was announced that there will be no services at all today or tonight, but there will be the regular services hereafter.

Friday at 3 p. m. Evangelist Demarest will deliver the second of the series of four lectures on Love and Marriage, to women only.

Just preceding the sermon yesterday, the three little children of the Demarests, the oldest 4 years and the youngest 4 months were brought to the platform and formally introduced to "our folks" here in Eugene and they received a flattering reception.

Mrs. Demarest's sermon text on "The Lily" was found in the 6th chapter of Matthew wherein Christians are told in part "take no thought, saying, what shall we eat? or what shall we drink? or wherewithal shall we be clothed? (For after all these things do the Gentiles seek)"

"The point she made here was that it meant Christians should take no anxious thought—being believers in God's will promise to supply all their needs. It's the unbelievers (Gentiles) who are logically expected to seek after these things. Christians who believe should not be anxious, was her advice."

"The devil says seek after them (worldly things too)" she said, "because God is going to reward you and you will get into heaven anyway. Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin."

She stated that God would teach us many of his truths from the things of nature, and that God reveals himself to us in his way, heavenly bodies in another way, but the principal way is through his incarnate word—Jesus.

She explained that all creation points directly, or indirectly to the savior of the world, and that he often drew upon the things of nature to make his meaning more understandable to his listeners.

"Christian," she said, "means a Christ man, or a Christ woman. Christians are not made like you make sausage by running it through a machine. Christians are born, not made."

"If you want purity in your life," she continued, "bring in Jesus. If you want to drive the devil out of Eugene, bring in Jesus."

COUNTY WILL PLAN BRIDGE ON AMAZON

Erection of a new bridge to span the outlet of the Amazon slough that crosses Chambers street is to be talked by the county court. The present bridge of 16 feet will probably be replaced by a span of at least 30 feet, according to Clinton Hurd, county commissioner, who today inspected the site.

"The shallow channel which was blasted out last year as an outlet for the slough waters has been considerably deepened and widened by the wash and the present bridge is too small," Mr. Hurd said.

The new channel is proving successful in providing for the Amazon drainage and is proving up on the claim of Frank L. Chambers who arranged for the cutting of the ditch in the belief that the waters of the slough would wash out a sufficiently deep channel to aid materially in the solving of the flood problem.

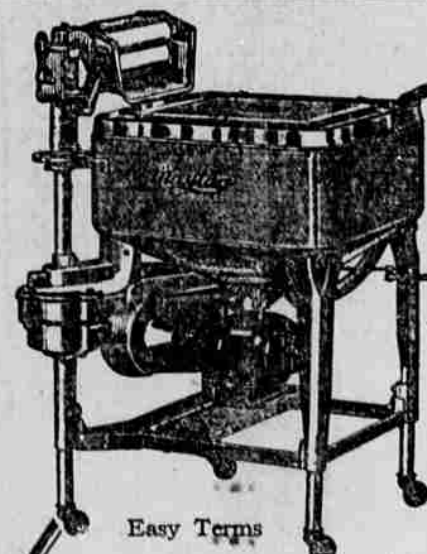

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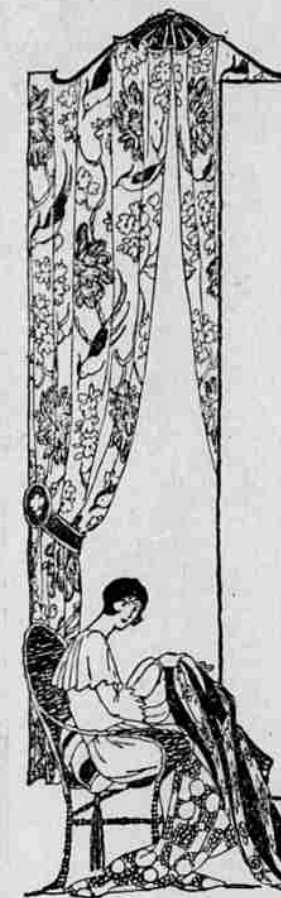

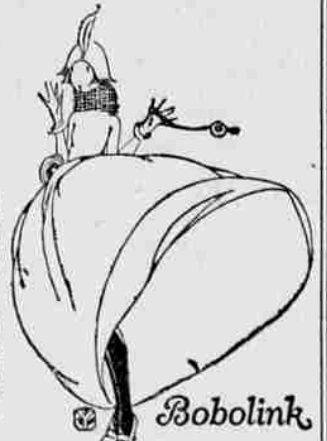
