'THIEF OF BAGDAD' PROVES ITS CHARM

Amazed and wondering, two packed houses of Eugene theatergoers sat charmed at the Helig last evening to witness the opening presentation of the masterpiece of fantasy and magic, "The Thief of Bagdad." One has to see to believe in the possibility of such a colossal and magnificent creation.

Even the more critical and sophisticated have to leave aside the usual acid remarks which are flung at the greater film attainments. As a matter of fact they are out of place in speaking of "The Thief of Bagdad," which is really perfect in every detail, and fulfills every expectation.

Have you all read those alluring, enchanting tales of the Arabian Nights and delighted in believing our senses existing in those magical realms? Of course, such existence was only in book-vision, we could see it only in our imagination.

But in "The Thief of Bagdad," the visions became realities. We behold in ecstasy the magic carpet really gliding through the fleecy clouds, the cloak of invisibility which fades with its owner into thin air right before our eyes, and the winged horse who gallops through the sky. Then there is the magic apple and the flights of thousands of stars which lead to the citadel of the moon and the magic rope which lengthens out and enables the hero to climb high buildings.

The actual accomplishment of these interesting and absorbing sights is worth the show itself without the cast of stars. It is almost unbelievable that such feats are really done as shown; however much they puzzle you, and however much you tell yourself that they can't be magic, they really take place.

Douglas Fairbanks wins by this picture the undisputed reputation of being the greatest of moving picture actors. Agile and graceful he admirably fits the character of the Thief, who audaciously goes about the city puffing. While he is an exuberant and full of action and life as ever he does a work of art in keeping the spectators remembering he is the Thief and not Douglas Fairbanks.

The scenery is delightful. The sights of the city of Bagdad are wonderfully carried out. And to create an appropriate environment the Helig has fittingly decorated for the play. The play continues tonight, Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights.

ARMORY SERVICE WILL BE TONIGHT

There were no services last night at the armory where the big revival campaign has been going on, but will be tonight and each night during the rest of the week. It may be of interest to have a few side lights thrown upon the life and characteristics of the woman preacher—Victoria Booth-Clibborn-Demarest.

Briefly, she was born in Paris, France, and belongs to a family of women preachers known from one end of the world to the other.

It was said of Catherine Booth—grandmother of Victoria Booth—that she was the greatest woman preacher that has been raised up. History seems to confirm it. However, time may demonstrate that there have been two such women preachers, for Victoria Booth's equal has not been seen or heard in Eugene heretofore. This thought is followed by the one that we would have liked to have heard her mother—Catherine Booth-Clibborn—whose work in other countries where religious liberty was not in order, finally landed her in jail for preaching the gospel.

From reports that have been circulated of Victoria Booth-Clibborn-Demarest, it would appear that in all her messages the dominant note has been—like a clarion call—"Put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ."

Her messages indicate a burning passion for the salvation of men and women from the paths of sin. They are refined, evangelistic to a high degree, wholesome and delivered with such power of grace and expression that there is little wonder that her audiences sit as if glued to their seats from the beginning to the end of her sermon.

Her platform presence is self-possessed and full of confidence. While her words are courteous, well modulated, sparkling with matchless richness of illustration, anecdote and wit, yet she calls a spade a spade and hands the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ to you in words of fire—with the perfume taken off.

A word about Mr. Demarest, the song leader and senior partner of this evangelist party. While he purposely keeps himself in the background and his voice is not heard in preaching as in his wife's so that one may get a better view of him and his inmost thoughts, yet they hear him in song and at the piano and very agreeably so.

Although a large man, he seems to be able to efface himself in such a manner that one overlooks his size and, well, one just naturally takes to him like a duck does to the water.
