

LARGE PORTION OF WHEAT RE-SEEDED EAST OF CASCADES

PENDELTON, Ore., March 3.—A large portion of the 170,000 acres of wheat that was killed in the heavy freeze of December, has already been re-seeded, according to reports received here from all parts of Umatilla county. The business of re-seeding is going on at full speed in all of the county's wheat areas, and it has practically been completed in the northwest, west and southwest portions of the county.

East of Pendleton on the reservation and around Athena, Helix and Weston, the work is going forward rapidly. The loss was one of the heaviest ever experienced by wheat farmers in this county, according to County Agent Fred Bennion. Approximately 60 per cent of the 170,000 acres being re-seeded will be sown to hard federation, a new but high yielding Australian variety. The cost of the extra seed purchased at inflated prices due to the general freeze is approximately \$500,000, while it is estimated that it costs at least that much to put the seed in the ground while it is estimated that all over the county the yield will be approximately 25 per cent less for spring than for fall sown wheat or a potential loss of nearly \$2,000,000 in addition to actual costs.

On the favorable side of the ledger, according to farm authorities, is the fact that the soil conditions are almost ideal at present with warm days and ample moisture content.

RADIO TO RECEIVE COOLIDGE ADDRESS

Eugene radio fans are preparing to "tune in" to President Coolidge's inaugural address tomorrow morning. Through an elaborate system of re-broadcasting, in which the largest broadcasting stations of the United States are linked into a chain, the address will be heard plainly in this city, local dealers predict. Stations on the Pacific coast re-broadcasting the address are KFI in Los Angeles, KPO in San Francisco, and KNX in Hollywood. All of these stations generally are received very loudly and clearly in Eugene.

The inaugural address, starting at 12:30 in Washington, D. C., will be heard in Eugene three hours earlier, or at 9:30. However, the broadcasting stations urge fans to "tune in" about 8 or 8:30 o'clock, as the proceedings of the ceremony will also be broadcast.

Service Held for Martin Johnson

Funeral services for Martin Johnson, who passed away on February 24, were held at the Blachly Union church on February 27, at 1:30 p. m., and the body laid to rest in the family plot in the Blachly cemetery. Mr. Johnson came to America in 1877 from Sweden, where he was born on August 24, 1867, being 67 years and six months of age at the time of his death. He located at Fira River in 1885 and was married to Miss Cera Larson of that community on September 30, 1890, and 12 years later, 1902, moved to Blachly. Mr. Johnson is survived by his widow and nine children, Mrs. W. E. Slayter, Anna, Fannie, Laura, Edwin, Gustave, Charlie, Ida and Wallace, and by a sister, Mrs. Bennett Olson of Paris, Oregon.

At the convention a special section will be assigned to Eugene's delegation, says E. U. Lee, in charge of the trip, and arrangements are being made to sing the local club's songs from time to time.

CIGARETTE PRICES TO TAKE BIG JUMP

Bad news reached Eugene smokers of Chesterfield, Camel, Lucky Strike and other popular brands of cigarettes today. On June 1 or thereabouts the price of popular cigarettes will jump from 15 cents per package to 18 cents or two for 35 cents, according to local dealers. This estimate is made from the new state tax schedule, based on the retail price of cigarettes.

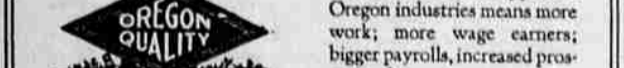
