

BUREAU WILL HELP ROAD CELEBRATION OF M'KENZIE PASS

Cooperation of the United States bureau of public roads for a celebration to mark the opening of the new McKenzie highway is promised in a letter received from C. H. Purcell, district engineer, by George Melvin Miller of this city.

The government engineer also gives details of the road improvement operations that are planned for the road this year. No definite plans have as yet been worked out concerning the road opening celebration although it is expected that both Eugene and Bend will participate.

The following is the letter received from the district engineer: "Our plans are to start surfacing operations just as soon as weather conditions will permit and to run two shifts, thus reducing the time that the road will be under construction. This plan under ordinary conditions will take us well into August or the first of September. Our suggestion as to time would be August, and the latter part of the season."

"There are several places along the road where a celebration could be held—Camp for instance. If you have agreed upon the date we will do all in our power to arrange the work and make the conditions as agreeable as they can be made for those attending."

AIR PATROL HERE IS HELD LIKELY

With the appropriation of \$50,000 for forest air patrol in the northwest approved by congress, there remains but little doubt that Eugene will again be a base for an air patrol this summer, believes Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest.

"It was thought for awhile that the appropriation was for air patrol throughout the country," said Mr. Macduff, "but the measure specifically reads for the northwest, so it virtually settles the fact that Oregon forests will get the patrol."

Mr. Macduff was asked for tentative estimates on the cost of operating the patrol during the coming year, which he based upon figures compiled by Lieutenant Lloyd Barnett, commander of the patrol last year. The expenses for conducting the patrol for the summer totaled \$4000. In his estimates Mr. Macduff figured the patrol would start from June 1 to June 15.

A supply of small bags will be obtained and in this way the poisoned grain may be sold in small quantities to farmers, Mr. Fletcher states.
