the report adopted today by the veterans' committee, giving the results of a country-wide survey of service hospitals. It said that on the whole, the veterans hospitals, "are in excellent shape," and that all cause for complaint had been called to the attention of the veterans' bureau.

Meanwhile, in the senate, warnings by President Cummins being without effect to restore order, the sergeant-at-arms was requested to "direct" senators to take their seats.

A last minute effort by Senator King, democrat, Utah, to get senate action on his world court proposal, was blocked by Senator Moses, republican, New Hampshire, one of the irreconcilables on the Versailles treaty.

Resolution Tabled
Senator King moved to go into executive session to consider the measure but Senator Moses replied with a motion to lay the resolution on the table and a rollicking chorus of "ayes" put it aside.

The house roll call for a quorum showed 250 members were present for the windup.

Farewell speeches were delivered by representatives attending their last session. Representative Barkley of Kentucky, ranking democrat on the house commerce committee, leading off with a parting address to Chairman Winslow, who was not a candidate for re-election.

In the senate, however, after the recess, there seemed to be no disposition to sink ocean songs, and the hilarity which usually marks the close of a session was lacking. There was the usual milling about on the floor. The governors of several states, here for the inauguration were on the floor.

Five are Killed In Dynamite Blast

REINSDORF, Saxony, March 4.—Five persons were killed and five others injured in a dynamite explosion following a fire in the powder division of the Westphalian-Anhalt Explosives factory here today. The force of the blast was so strong that the roofs of surrounding buildings were torn off.

gross earnings bill reached him in the meantime. The ways and means committee, at a hastily called meeting, instructed Chairman Gordon of the house committee to attempt to rush the utilities tax bill through three readings and to final passage in the house, this to be followed by similar action in the senate if the bill passed the house. Gordon, being a member of the organization in the house con-

ceded reluctantly to do this. He kept faith with the committee, however, but failed to railroad the bill. The result was that the governor vetoed the service commission appropriation. Subsequently the utilities tax bill was passed and the appropriation bill passed over the governor's veto, without opposition.

Schedule Is Given
The schedule of taxes imposed upon the railroads and utilities by the measure follows:
