

WATERS OF LAKE SLOWLY LEAKING TO RAILWAY BORE

DENVER, Colo., March 5.—Slowly diminishing through subterranean cracks, waters of Crater lake, 1300 feet off the Moffat tunnel on the crest of the continental divide are leaking into the great railway bore. It has been determined by scientific tests that the leakage is not a result of a fault, but is due to the fact that the water in the eastern portal of the tunnel February 15, at the rate of 1900 gallons a minute, has diminished to about 261 gallons a minute and the lake today is nearly empty.

This phenomenon has been with determination to workers building the six mile tunnel through the heart of the Rocky mountains to provide fast-travel transcontinental rail connections despite nature's own barrier in the expansive mountain ranges.

The flow of water into the lake was at first believed by workers to have been caused by striking an underground reservoir. Since February 19, officials employed a scientific analysis with the result that chloride of lime poured into the lake has seeped to a region covered with snow from 30 to 40 feet deep and steps must be taken, according to officials, to stop the leaks before the spring thaw, lest the onrush of Crater lake's supply should too rapidly engulf the bore, where several hundred workmen are engaged on the project.

Work, however, has never been seriously hampered by the water. The slope of the tunnel provides a natural drainage system.

Chairman W. P. Robinson of the state Moffat tunnel commission, has announced that crevices through which the water pours will be covered and drains will be constructed to carry the water away. Expense of stopping the leaks would not be large, according to Mr. Robinson.

Fighting Reported Between Italians And Bedouin men

LONDON, March 5.—Special dispatches from Cairo say that reports are current there of fighting between Arab and Italian troops and Bedouins within Egyptian territory. Fifteen Bedouins were killed and many others captured, it is stated.

The Italians are also declared to have been sharply engaged with the natives near Benghazi and to have suffered considerable losses.

Italy and Egypt are in dispute regarding the latter's western frontier, Italy claiming that Arabub Oasis belongs to Tripoli. The Italian claim is based on an agreement signed at Paris in 1919, but which was not carried out at the time Egypt gained her independence. Negotiations were held last year, but without result.

Heavy Gales are Reported in France

PARIS, March 5.—The weather has changed abruptly since Sunday and there has been a succession of fairs, accompanied by snow, sleet or rain.

The early fruit and grain crops have been destroyed in many places by hail stones. Heavy seas, approximating the proportions of a tidal wave, destroyed or sunk a large number of fishing boats at St. Tropez, Ste. Maxime and Caprievane. A similar tale of disaster, come from the Channel and Atlantic coasts.

Eugene Girl is O. A. C. Debater

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, March 5.—Special—Georgia English of Eugene was a member of the O. A. C. women's debate team which defeated the team at the University of British Columbia 3 to 0. The question

was "Resolved, that the present immigration law should be amended to permit Japanese to enter the United States on the same basis as Europeans." The O. A. C. team upheld the negative side of the question.

Miss English was the second speaker for the negative team and argued that the Japanese were a social menace. This is the first year Miss English has participated in intercollegiate debate.

CHICAGO, March 5.—While his master was taking the oath as vice-president of the United States, and starting staid senators yesterday, Marico, wire-haired fox terrier, belonging to General Charles G. Dawes, disappeared from the Dawes' home in Evanston.

BISHOP MURRAH DIES IN MEMPHIS

MEMPHIS, Tenn., March 5.—Bishop William B. Murrah, of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, died here early today following a paralytic stroke in January last year, which was aggravated from a fall from a chair in his home several days ago. The end came unexpectedly, following a sudden turn for the worse shortly after midnight, last.

Courty, affable, dignified and scholarly in his bearing, Bishop William B. Murrah, exemplified the highest ideal of a gentleman of the old school type. As a result of his clear thinking and deliberate judgment, his counsel was much sought by leaders of the south. He was regarded as a wise and safe counselor, and progressive in his thinking and utterances.

Bishop Murrah up to the time he was stricken, had supervision of the Alabama, North Alabama and North Georgia conferences, three of the largest in the church. During the 1918-22 quadrennium he was president of the three conferences in Missouri and the Denver conference.

At one time during his service as bishop, he was in charge of missions in the Orient, and made several trips to Methodist fields in the Far East.

Bishop Murrah was born at Pyleville, Ala., in 1853. He graduated from Southern University, Greensboro, Ala., with the degree of A. B. in 1875, the honorary degree D. D. from Centenary College, Louisiana, and L. L. D. from Wofford College, South Carolina.

Bishop Murrah was married in 1881 to Miss Beulah Fitzhugh, Mrs. Murrah and a son survive.

Telephone Company In Fortieth Year

The American Telephone and Telegraph company is this year celebrating its fortieth corporate anniversary.

In writing its certificate of incorporation 40 years ago, the organizers used some phrases, which, in the light of later developments, seem strikingly prophetic. The anniversary being celebrated throughout the Bell system this year served to give point to these words from a document now four decades old and furnishes proof of the perfect clearness of vision of these pioneers of our national telephone system.

The purpose of the organization is significantly stated in the certificate to be: "To connect one or more points in each and every city, town, or place in the state of New York, with one or more points in each and every other city, town or place in said state, and in each and every other of the United States, and in Canada, and Mexico; and each and every of said cities, towns, and places is to be connected with each and every other city, town, or place in said states and countries, and also by cable and other appropriate means with the rest of the known world."

It was to meet the demand for such a unified service, nationwide in scope, that on February 28, 1885, the American Telephone and Telegraph company was founded. For the first 14 years of its existence it was distinctly the Telephone company of the long lines, but in 1899, it took over the central functions of the American Bell Telephone company, since which time it has acted as the central organization of the Bell system, in addition to operating long distance traffic over the long lines.

SEVEN DEATHS IN QUAKE REPORTED

OTTAWA, Ont., March 5.—Eastern Canada still is endeavoring to ascertain the extent of the damage caused by the earthquakes of Saturday, Sunday and Monday. Some points were still isolated, telegraph wires being put out of commission by the tremors. The latest quake, recorded at 10 a. m. Monday, was slight and caused little damage. Reports from all sections of the province of Quebec show that in addition to the heavy property loss and numerous injuries to residents, seven deaths were recorded, a majority being caused by shock. The property loss was exceptionally heavy in the valley of the Ottawa river and the St. Lawrence and the Saguenay basins.

The town of Tadoussac, 25 miles from Murray Bay, in the quake region, has not been heard from since the first shock rocked the district. Telegraph and telephone communication to the settlement was crippled.

O. A. C. Memorial Union Explained

The O. A. C. Memorial union is an incorporated body under the laws of Oregon providing for the construction of a building that will be a permanent memorial to the college and state heroes of the Spanish American and world wars. It will be a building of utility as it will house all campus organizations and activities, alumni offices and faculty meeting rooms.

It will seek to draw together the four component parts of any college: Students, alumni, faculty and friends of the institution. It will

be a great gathering place for college interest, a magnet to attract students and alumni in all walks of life and a meeting pot to create a college democracy.

The total cost will be \$500,000. Of this sum, students contributed more than \$233,000 in an intensive campaign of a week. Faculty members pledged nearly \$31,000 and alumni and friends of the college are out to raise the rest needed for the building.

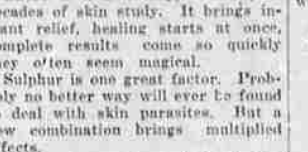
of seven members—two students, one regent and four alumni. This representative committee is in charge of collection of funds and will control financing after the sum is pledged.

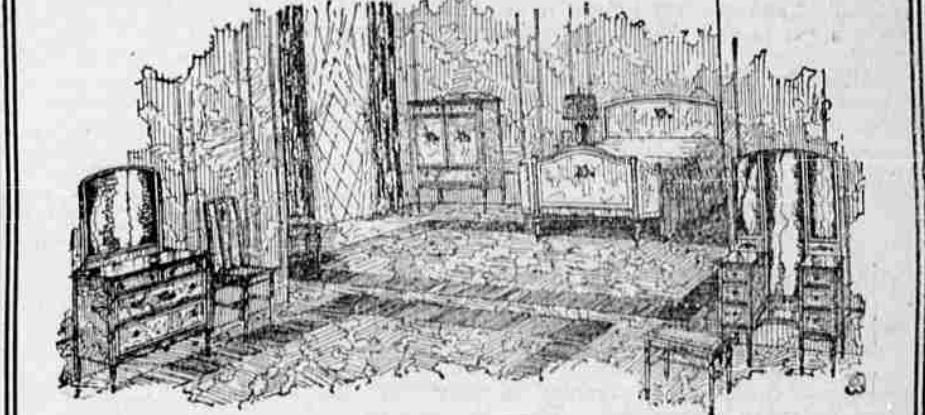
