

### 'MUSIC MEMORY' CONTEST PLANNED

A "music memory contest" will be conducted for school children of the seventh and eighth grades in Geary and Frances Willard, Jr., schools beginning Monday, March 9, announces Miss Leona Marsters, supervisor of music. The contest is to last 12 weeks.

The purpose of the contest is to make the pupils familiar with classical selections," says Miss Marsters, "as well as to be able to name each piece, spell it and spell the name of the composer.

Every pupil will be given an opportunity to hear each number on the phonograph several times. In addition, the piece may be heard as many more times as the pupil desires. Each contestant will keep a notebook of the music studied, and prizes will be awarded at the end of the 12-week period who scores highest in the test, and the one who keeps the best notebook.

Beginning next Monday, The Guard will publish the titles of three of the selections to be studied, and the stories connected with each. By knowing the story corresponding to the music, the pupil is aided in remembering it."

### FRATERNITY COMES TO OREGON CAMPUS

The University of Oregon's "Journalism Fraternity," Phi Sigma Pi, will be installed as Alpha Sigma chapter of Theta Chi, national social fraternity, here today, Saturday and Sunday. The local chapter will become the 41st active chapter of Theta Chi.

Organized in 1920 on the Oregon campus, Phi Sigma Pi has been one of the strongest of local fraternities and its active membership includes a number of journalism students. Donald Woodward, editor, and Harold Kirk, managing editor, of the Oregon Emerald, students' daily paper, are members of the organization as well as a number of other journalism students on the campus. The chapter has a total of 67 active and alumni members.

**Journalists Being**

Besides the large number of journalism students who are members of Phi Sigma Pi, the fraternity also has a number of professional journalists throughout the state of Oregon among its alumni. Among the alumni members are: Wilfred Allen, editor of the Grants Pass Courier; Ruel Moore, northwest manager of the United Press, of Portland; Taylor Huston, news editor of the Oregon City Enterprise; Theodore James, telegraph editor of the Astoria Astorian; C. K. Logan, city editor of Salem Statesman; John M. Anderson, who is on the copy desk of the Portland Telegram; and Hal E. Hoss, managing editor of the Oregon City Enterprise.

Two members of the Oregon faculty will be initiated as alumni members of Theta Chi, George S. Turnbull and William G. Hale. Mr. Turnbull is professor of journalism here and former news editor of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer. He graduated from the University of Washington in 1915. Mr. Hale is the dean of the University of Oregon school of law.

### PRIMA DONNA TO SING IN EUGENE

Florence Easton, prima donna soprano of the Metropolitan Opera company, will appear at the Methodist church Tuesday night, March 10, under the auspices of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon.

This great artist has not only been preeminently successful in Europe but in the seven years she has been a principal member of the Metropolitan Opera company, each year she has created new characters in her already spacious hall of fame. Among her latest leading parts in New York are the title roles of "Carmen" and "Mme. Butterfly," and the Princess von Werdenberg in Strauss' "Der Rosenkavalier."

Equally as great in concert, Florence Easton's popularity in this field is increasing. In fact, so many demands have been made for her recitals that she has found it necessary to devote more time to this branch of her art, and during the season of 1922-23 appeared with Metropolitan only from November to February until the end of the season, a precedent it appears she will be forced to follow in succeeding seasons due to the country-wide demand for her recitals.
