Crater Lake Park Gains Road Funds

WASHINGTON, March 6.—One appropriation of \$2,500,000 for construction and improvement of roads and trails in 17 national parks was announced today by the interior department. It is the second appropriation in a \$7,500,000 three years' park road program to be completed in 1936.

Glacier National park, Montana, was allotted the largest figure, \$450,000, of which \$410,000 will be expended on the trans-mountain road to open the first means of vehicular travel from the east to west side. Other allotments included in Oregon, Crater Lake park, \$183,000 for entrance roads.

A fund of \$97,000 is set aside for the national monument road surveys.

Matrimony Takes Slump in County

Matrimony has shown a big drop with the present month and up to late this afternoon nearly six days had passed with a sum total of only three licenses granted at the office of the county clerk. This is a very bad start considering that March as a rule shows the first rise in applications for licenses culminating in the usual banner month of June. County Span Will Soon be Complete

Work on the Camp Creek bridge which has been under construction by the county crews for some time is expected to be completed next week, according to a report today of Clinton Hurd, county commissioner. The next big bridge job will be the erection of the Curran span on Row river. As this project will total more than \$1500 the county recently advertised for bids and they have received several inquiries on the specifications. All county projects over \$1500 have to be let on bids, members of the court point out.

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MAN AND WOMAN TRIED FOR THEFT

Wheat Market Registers Break

WINNIPEG, March 6.—Wheat registered a loss of 11 3/4c for today. The May delivery plunged to \$1.91 3/8 just before the close.

CHICAGO, March 6.—More than six cents a bushel break in prices took place in the wheat market before trading had been in progress an hour. Forced down by heavy selling, May delivery fell to as low as \$1.80 1/4, compared with \$1.92 1/4 to \$1.92 3/8 at yesterday's finish.

President Meets With New Cabinet

WASHINGTON, March 6.—President Coolidge met today for the first time with his reconstructed cabinet, Secretaries Kellogg and Jardine joining in the discussion of government policies.

The department of justice was without representation at the hearing inasmuch as the nomination of Charles Becker Warren of Michigan to be attorney-general has not been confirmed by the senate. As the cabinet meeting was getting under way former Secretary Hughes dropped in to bid President Coolidge goodbye preparatory to sailing tomorrow for Bermuda for a rest.

Insurance act Violation Denied

PORTLAND, Ore., March 6.—Phillip Hammond Oregon City lawyer, and a member of the legislature, pleaded not guilty in federal court today to a charge of violating the war risk insurance act by overcharging parents of a deceased veteran for making out their applications for compensation. The trial was set for May 7.
