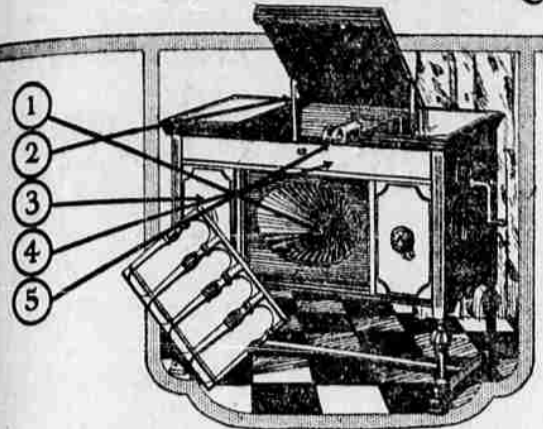

Lieut. Kennedy is To be Transferred For Observations

WASHINGTON, March 6.—Lieutenant Frank E. Kennedy, United States navy, whose detention at the state insane asylum, Napa, Cal., has led to legal proceedings, has been ordered transferred to Washington for observation by naval medical authorities here.

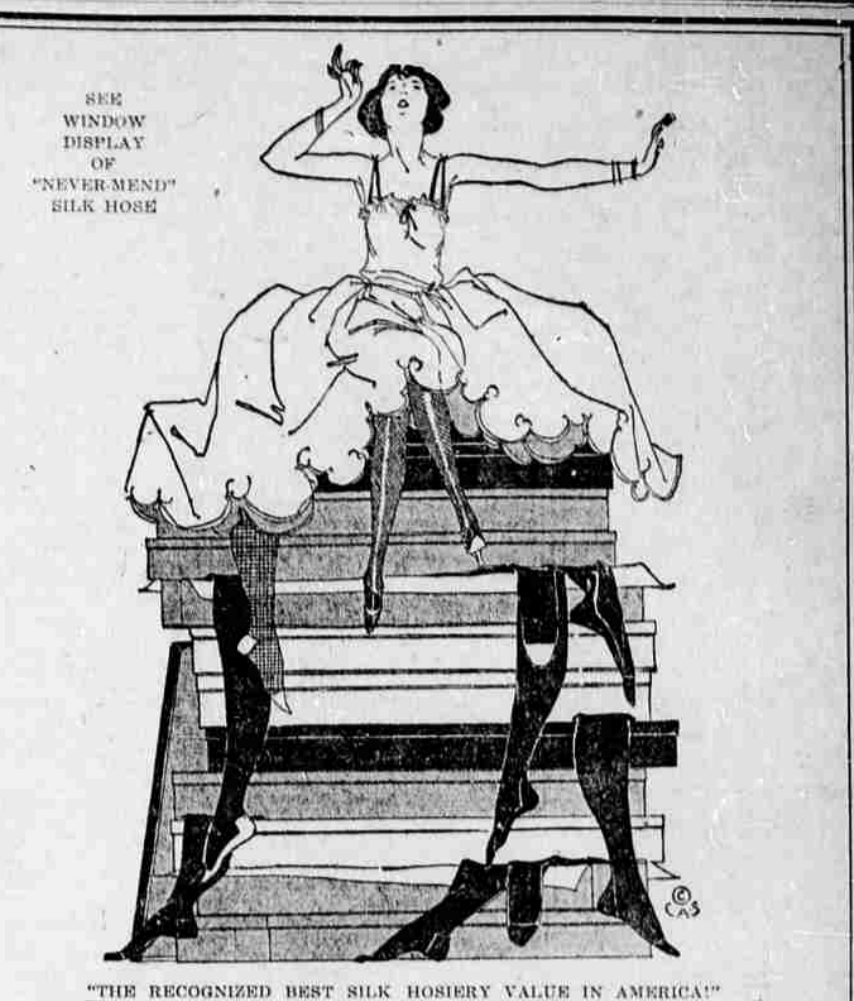
