EXAMINATION OF STOKES IS ENDED

CHICAGO, March 6.—(AP)—Three days of direct examination of W. E. D. Stokes on trial with Robert Lee, Chicago negro, for conspiring to defame Mrs. Stokes were ended this afternoon and in the ten minutes that remained before the luncheon recess Milton D. Smith, assistant states attorney, asked questions that had the aged defendant shaking with rage and shouting replies over his counsel's objection.

"Did you not at the time your wife was in delicate condition at your Lexington, Ky., farm, accuse her of sleeping in Edgar T. Wallace's apartment in New York?" demanded the prosecutor.

Repeated "I did not," from Mr. Stokes were heard above the shouting of defense and prosecuting attorneys as by a face, the New York millionaire shook his finger at Smith.

His last statement on direct examination had been that he never had accused his wife of any personal wrongdoing during the period of their life together.

In concluding more than nine hours of a rapid-fire description of his three years investigation of information that Mrs. Stokes once was an inmate of the notorious Everleigh club, known in the night life of Chicago years ago, Mr. Stokes denied testimony by his mother-in-law, Mrs. Arthur Scott Miller of Denver, Colo., that he had learned much of her family's history through viewing a family album with her at his side, that he never had threatened to drag Mrs. Stokes' name in the mire, unless she permitted a divorce or that he had told Mrs. Miller that he had had her daughter investigated before he married her.

As he neared the end of his testimony, Mr. Stokes also asserted that he never had published any of the information he or numerous attorneys or investigators had obtained against Mrs. Stokes.

phone system, but they explain that it has taken years to develop.

Light plays the important role in the process; and the whole thing goes through something like this:

The transparent film of the picture to be sent is inserted in a cylindrical form, which revolves slowly, exposing the film to an intense beam of light; the light, penetrating the film, shines onto a photoelectric cell. Similar to the needle on a phonograph record, the light slowly covers the entire film as it is rotated. Variation in effect of the light on the photoelectric cell is resultant from the various degrees of light and shade of the film; and this variation determines the current that goes over the wire.

At the receiving end an unexposed film is rotated on a cylinder, similar to the sending device, and a beam of light, determined by the varying current coming from the sending machine, is allowed to pass slowly over it. Thus, just as a film in an ordinary camera reacts to light, this film reacts to light sent over the wire.

When the film has been wholly exposed to the varying light it is treated as any other photographic negative—developed and printed.
