Baked Herring
Allow one medium-sized fish for two persons. Have fish cleaned and boned. Wash carefully in very cold water and dry between towels. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and few drops of lemon juice. Roll in fine corn meal. Put into a well-greased shallow pan or on a baking sheet, skin side down. Brown skin side and then turn and brown flesh side. Bake 20 or 25 minutes in a hot oven. Serve garnished with slices of lemon.

Broiled Halibut Steak
Have fish cut in inch slices, one and one-half pounds halibut steak will serve four persons. Wash steak and wipe as dry as possible. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and place in a well greased broiler. Turn often while broiling. When fish is tender and a delicate brown remove from broiler to hot platter, spread with softened butter and sprinkle with finely minced parsley and a dash of paprika.

Baked and Stuffed Fish
Any fish weighing from two to four and five pounds can be stuffed and baked. Blue fish, small cod, haddock, lake trout, whitefish and snook are all delicious baked and make a substantial "piece de resistance" for dinner.

Mushroom Stuffing
Two cups bread crumbs, 4 tablespoons melted butter, 6 tablespoons chopped mushrooms, 1 tablespoon capers, 1 teaspoon tabasco sauce. Squeeze bread crumbs out of hot water. Add melted butter, mushrooms, capers and tabasco sauce and mix well.

Housework and Hands
That may be overdriving I suspect it is. But we all know of women whose beauty has depended more on their hands than on their face. And does not the mere mention of the name of Eleanor Duse conjure up a vision of hands that were the embodiment of grace and poetry?

You can do all your housework and still have lovely hands if you protect them by rubber or loose canvas gloves when you are scrubbing, sweeping, dusting or engaging in anything that soils the hands.

You should always protect your hands from dirt whenever possible since it is not advisable to wash them more than is absolutely necessary. Too frequent washing dries the skin and injures the texture.

Never put your hands into hot water containing strong soaps or washing powders without slipping on your rubber gloves.

If your hands are badly chapped smear them nightly with vaseline or cold cream and wear loose gloves all night. In a short time the texture of the skin will be soft and satiny.

Never use strong toilet soaps on your hands. Have a good mild soap and a nail brush with medium bristles that will remove all grime and soil from the cracks and crevices.

After each washing dry the hands thoroughly. One of the chief causes of rough, coarse looking hands is hasty drying which leaves them particularly susceptible to changes in temperature.

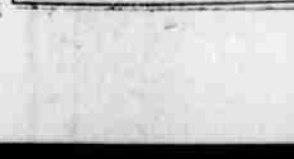
Lemon juice is effective in removing any stains and should be rubbed into the skin after cleansing. A lotion of glycerine and rosewater after this will keep the hands soft and white.

A Massage is Good
Once or twice a week you should give your hands a massage with warm olive or coconut oil. Begin at the finger tips and massage each finger downward as if you were working on a close-fitting glove. Then extend this treatment over the wrist with the same short crossing strokes. Continue the treatment to the elbow and even up to the shoulder. Sleeveless gowns must be served.

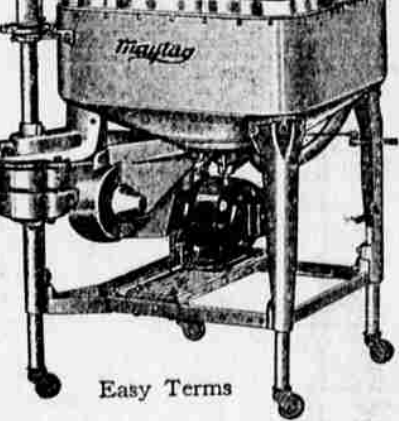
